BOTTLERS FORM NEW STATEWIDE ORGANIZATION

Organization of an Oregon State Bottlers' association was effected yesterday afternoon at a meeting at the Marion hotel. Bottlers were present from all over the state. Upwards of 25 men were present at the meeting, representing not only bottling works but supply men whose business is connected with the industry. Officers of the new organization were elected as follows: Walter Stoltz, Salem, president;

Clarence Glides, Oregon City, vice-president; J. W. Nelson, Salem, secretary-treasurer. The two Salem men already held the same offices in the Willamette Valley Bottlers' association. Oregon has been one of a very few states in the union not having an organization of bottlers. The state organizations effect publicity for their industry and keep an eye on legislation that affects them. As a beginning of a campaign to promote the use of light beverages in Oregon, May 6, has been set aside as beverage day. Present plans provide for the day being observed throughout the entire country. All Oregon bottlers will open their plants for inspection on that date, and serve drinks to all visitors. A separate organization was effected of bottling supply men yesterday. Local bottling houses served beverages at the luncheon.
