## Club Studies History Of Salem

Intensely interesting facts about Salem's early history gleaned from the stories of the few remaining pioneers, from library references, and from personal experience, were presented at a meeting of the Etokta club at the home of Mrs. E. E. Fieber yesterday when the club members took up the first lesson of the series of studies sent out by the National League of Women Voters.

"History and Population" are the subjects of the first lesson of the "Know Your Town" series and the women who attended the meeting yesterday became greatly enthused over the manner in which early history of Salem was presented to them. The Etokta club is the first of the local groups to take up the studies sent out through the national league, a branch of which was formed here last month.

Assignment of the next two lessons in the series--home and living costs, and health--was made at the close of the discussion and methods of obtaining the most complete information were discussed.
