

SALEM VS SALEM DOOMED UNLESS \$500 IS RAISED

According to present indications, local high school authorities have seen the handwriting on the wall so far as the intersectional debate with Salem, Massachusetts is concerned. The greatest obstacle—looming at present as an insurmountable one—is the matter of securing enough money to finance the contest.

The easterners at first wanted to send a three-man team and coach, the cost estimated to be something over \$1500. In reply to their challenge, J. C. Nelson, local high school principal, expressed a preference for a two-man team stating that most college teams now consist of that number and that expenses of the trip could be materially cut down by eliminating the third man. Debate authorities at the eastern school have replied that they stand willing to concede the point.

Expensive prohibitive. But even with two men and a coach, the most careful figuring cannot get the estimated cost of the trip down below \$1000. Of the amount the local high school would have to pay half, besides entertainment while the visiting team remained in the city. Present indications are that the \$500 is just \$500 more than can be put up, every cent of high school student body money already being planned for a place.

"We would have to depend very largely on the business men of the city," said Mr. Nelson this morning, "and they are crowded pretty hard to support a number of projects already. Furthermore, it would distract attention from our legitimate business, and winning the state championship in debate, I hate to let the state question take a back seat." It seems went out in earnest to defeat its eastern namesake it would mean putting the two best local debaters to work on the intersectional question, and letting the state question be handled by a team admittedly not so strong as the intersectional team. Orlando Hornum, local debate coach, has stated that he sees no practical way of avoiding this difficulty.

So far as agreement upon the question is concerned, the two schools have come to terms. The question will have to do with the federal child labor amendment, and will be stated as an act to apply to any particular state. Originally the easterners wanted simply to defend the action taken by Massachusetts in rejecting the amendment. Local authorities ob-

AIRPLANES SCORE IN ATTACK UPON 'FRISCO

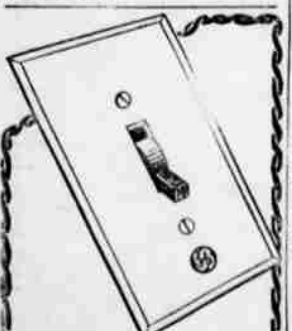
San Francisco, Cal., March 11.—Four huge searchlights of 5000 yards range failed to find an army airplane which was theoretically attacking San Francisco last night. The test, which was under the direction of Major J. S. Platt, was between Fort Scott, as the defending base and an army plane from Crissy field, as the attacking force.

"Fort Scott was saved but San Francisco was at the mercy of the searchlights," said Major Platt at the conclusion of the test. Later he said "our principal trouble was that the enemy avoided our range."

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NEW HIGHLAND SCHOOL PLANS ARE SUBMITTED

Plans for an addition to Highland school were presented to the Salem school board at its meeting last night. Fred Legge, local architect who submitted the plans, estimated that the addition would cost between \$30,000 and \$35,000. A number of new rooms were involved in the plans, including an assembly hall. Legge proposed also that the basement be deepened by several inches.

It was estimated that an additional \$5000 would be necessary to equip the building. Members of the board indicated that they would take the matter under consideration and decide as soon as possible whether or not they favor building the addition and if they favor it how the necessary money is to be raised.

Action was taken by the board granting school holidays on April 10 and 13, the Friday before and the Monday after Easter.
