

# \$10,000,000 BODY FORMS TO STAGE PORTLAND FAIR

Announcing as their purpose the staging of a world's fair in Portland in 1926, a group of 27 Portland men have formed a corporation capitalized at \$10,000,000 and the articles were filed yesterday with the state corporation department. The first three names on the list of incorporators are H. J. Bessing, B. S. Josselyn and A. H. Massey. The fair will be known as the Pacific American International exposition.

Relative to financing the enterprise the articles say:

"The business of this corporation shall be conducted without profit to itself or its members and at the time of making these articles of incorporation this corporation possesses no money or property whatever, and the source of its income shall be from gifts, donations, subscriptions, contributions, admissions, concessions, charges, and from loans, as well as from appropriations from municipalities, states and nations."

**AMERICANS CAPTAIN THREE OXFORD TEAMS**

Oxford, Eng., March 12.—Americans are this year captaining three Oxford university teams—the lacrosse, fencing and boxing squads.

E. F. Eagan of Colorado, has for three years been the mainstay of the university boxing club, and two years ago won the Oxford-Cambridge meet by favorable decisions in both the light heavyweight and heavyweight classes.

This year he has succeeded the Marquis of Clydesdale as captain of the Oxford team, but has been severely handicapped by an injured eye.

**BRITISH ARMY REDUCED**

London, March 12.—(By Associated Press.)—The British army estimates for 1925-26 fix the land forces at 109,600 men, a reduction of 10,000, while the amounts for maintenance will total 44,500,000 pounds sterling, against 45,000,000 pounds last year.

In a memorandum accompanying the estimates, the secretary for war, Sir Laming Worthington Evans declared the recruiting last year was unsatisfactory and that more than half the applicants were rejected as not coming up to the high army standards of physical education and character.

## JURY FOREMAN IS BOMB TARGET

Chicago, March 12.—Laurence Clody, foreman of the coroner's jury investigating the death of William R. McCintock, "millionaire orphan," it became known today, was the object yesterday of a bomb attack which tore out the front of his florist shop. He was at his home at the time.

The explosion came, he said, after a man had called at the shop and a telephone call had been received at his home making inquiries about his connection with the store and the jury.

During the inquiry, which recently was conducted for 20 days, Clody presented a statement by a lawyer for William D. Shepherd, foster father and chief heir of McCintock, that the jury must think the presiding deputy coroner was prejudiced in favor of Judge Harry Olson, instigator of the investigation.

During the short business meeting Professor Morton E. Peck, president of the league, presided and called for short reports of the various sections of the league.

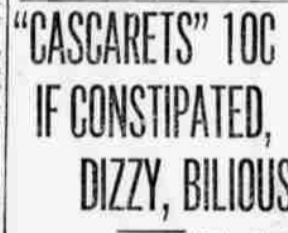
