PASTOR-LAWYER FILES FIRST SUIT

Rev. Martin Fereshetian, pastor of the Unitarian church, has donned his barrister's wig, and yesterday his first complaint as a lawyer was filed in circuit court. It is an interesting complaint, and lawyers who looked at it say apparently a perfectly good complaint, sound as a nut on an axle, but it has a novel touch to it, because it is written something like a novel and shows the artistry of the litigator.

There is nothing dull, or formal about the Rev. Mr. Fereshetian's first complaint. It deals with a young Willamette student, Elwood A. Towner, who is suing one Philip Grosvenor. Towner complains that while he was walking along the pavement on the road between the Mt. Angel abbey and the Silverton-Mt. Angel road, Grosvenor's automobile struck him and hurled him 50 feet. The injuries resulted, he estimates, have damaged him to the amount of \$2500. While the accident happened back in 1923, it is stated there has been much correspondence between the parties, finally resulting in the present law suit.

The Rev. Mr. Attorney Fereshetian starts his complaint by advising that between the Mt. Angel abbey and the Silverton-Mt. Angel road, lies another road, and in true dramatic style leads the reader up to the climax until the reader fairly sees the young Willamette student hurtling through the air like a projectile.

Salem Youth Dies at Naval Hospital

George Young, who died March 1 at a naval hospital in San Diego was the son of Mr. and Mrs. G. H. Young, for the past 10 years residents of Salem. He himself lived with his parents in Salem up until last August, when he enlisted in the United States navy. He attended Salem high school at one time, and was well known there and in many other sections of the city.

He was 18 years of age at the time of his death. The illness came as a result of appendicitis and pneumonia, the two combining to weaken his system to such an extent that the efforts of naval doctors to bring him thru were unavailing.

The body was shipped to Salem and the funeral held this week.

result of the exercise of a proper governmental function by the state which chartered it. "No person can claim protection of the federal constitution on the plea that he is being deprived of his property without due process of law because of any loss which may be suffered as an indirect result of the exercise of a proper governmental function by a state, regardless of how certain or how serious this loss may be."

Claims Held Absurd The cry of bolshevism that has been raised, according to the brief, was held to be "absurd and unjustifiable."

The killing of Robert Frank, a Chicago school boy by two youths, Natha, Leopold and Richard Loeb, which was brought into the school controversy by the Sisters as illustrating the need of religious and moral training, brought from the state the reply that the two culprits had been educated in private schools.

Advocates Intervene The supreme court today granted permission to the North Pacific Union conference of Seventh Day Adventists to file a brief as a friend of the court in the Oregon school case, with the consent of both sides. The Adventists are conducting 33 church schools within the state, and have joined the Episcopal church, also appearing as a friend of the court, in attacking the law.

The churches contend that the new status would deprive private schools of their natural rights, holding that parents have a common law right to direct the education of their children.

The Adventists asserted that Oregon had no right to abrogate the vested rights of private schools and could not dismiss the contractual rights of schools incorporated under the laws of the state. The school law was denounced as "the encroachment of unbridled powers upon natural and inalienable rights."
