YESTERDAY'S RESULTS

Salem 25; Wallowa 10.
Franklin 32; Medford 16.

When north met south and east met west in the first round of the 1925 state basketball tournament last night, the north and the west came off winners. Salem high had little difficulty in defeating the scrappy but inexperienced Wallowa team from the eastern edge of the state. In a game marked by desperate fighting on both sides and high class basketball throughout, Franklin high, Portland champion, won over Medford high, champions of southern Oregon and winners of the tourney a year ago.

Although the Salem-Wallowa clash was close at the start, the result was never in doubt after the first ten minutes of play. The

Wallowa aggregation fought hard, but was no match for the more experienced and smoothly working local quintet.

It would be difficult to find an outstanding star on either team, none of the players going in for individual playing. Heenan, for the locals, showed up well in breaking for the basket, although he missed many easy shots at close range. Asby showed up well. For the easterners Greer put up perhaps the best game.

A number of substitutions were made on the Salem team after the game got well started. Nash went in; Olinger went in; Bob Drager came out and went in for brother John. Heenan came out and went in again shortly before the game ended. No substitutions were made by the Wallowa coach.

In the Medford-Franklin clash a red headed, diminutive Franklin forward proved the undoing of the southern Oregon title holders. Scallon shining light of the game, made 16 points, largely field goals from near the center of the floor. Without Scallon's points the score would have been exactly 16 to 16.

The game was considerably closer than the 2 to 1 proportion of the score would indicate. The teams were closely matched, fought hard and showed high class basketball throughout the tilt. Medford had a non-star team with an aggressive offense and a close defense. It is conceded that Medford could have defeated nearly any other team in the tournament.

The other six teams in the tournament, having drawn byes, pass to the second round, which begins this afternoon, without playing. Salem will open the second round as it did the first, the Salem-Astoria tilt being slated to begin at 2:30. Years ago, before the state tournament was established, Astoria was one of Salem's most

crucial rivals in basketball, usually playing two games a season. Astoria has come within an ace of winning the state meet several times. A few of the Salem players dropped in on the Astoria-Rainier game at Portland, Monday night, and probably have their opponents sized up fairly well in consequence. They expect to win, but until the game is actually played the result will be in doubt, like everything in basketball.

Concerning the Arago team, which meets McMinnville, little is known. They may prove to be a dark horse in the tourney. Eugene and Hood River, who start the ball rolling tonight, are believed to be evenly matched, although little or no hope is available upon which to base a comparison. The Pendleton-Franklin mix finishes the second round.

Scio Burns Bonds.

GOLDEN BEARS MEET DEFEAT

Corvallis, Or., March 13.—The Golden Bears of the University of California will face an uphill fight as they enter the second basketball game tonight of the three-game series to decide the coast championship as the result of their defeat last night by the Oregon Aggies. After a hard fight, with the outcome undecided until a few minutes before the end of the game, the Aggies emerged on the long end of a 32 to 25 score. The second game of the series is scheduled for tonight.

Ridings, forward, and Stoddard, guard, were the outstanding players of the entire game. Ridings caging the ball for a total of 14 counters, while his team mate accounted for 14.

Jorgenson, with 10 points to his credit and Higgins, with 8, starred for the Bears.

The first half ended with the score board reading 16 to 11, for

the Aggies. Late in the second half, O. A. G. opened a drive that gave her an 11-point lead with just four minutes of play remaining. Coach Price then made several shifts in the California line in effort to save the game, but the Aggies held too great a lead.
