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BRITISH NAVAL ESTIMATES SHOW SOME INCREASE

London, Mar. 13.—(By Associated Press)—The British navy estimates for 1925-26 amount to \$8,500,000 pounds sterling, an increase over the current year of 4,700,000 pounds.

A further sum of 1,500,000 pounds is due to uncontrollable causes such as increase in wages and prices and reduction in the quantity of surplus war stores available for use without replacement. These items account for considerably more than half the net increase.

The estimates do not include provisions for the commencement of any new construction.

Provision is made in the estimates for the resumption of work on development of the naval base at Singapore, this being deemed a vital link in the chain of communication with the British dominions of the Pacific.

The personnel of the fleet for 1925-26 is fixed at 192,675, an increase of 2175.

The shorter bible cuts out wine.

New York, March 13.—"A shorter bible" from which are eliminated references to wine familiar in the King James version, has been published by Charles Scribner's Sons.

The quotation in other versions of the bible about David dealing out "a cake of bread and a good piece of flesh and a flagon of wine" appears in the shorter bible as "a roll of bread, a portion of meat and a cake of raisins."

The shorter bible, however, contains the phrase "wine is a mocker," "strong drink is turbulent," "so look not on wine when it is red," and "be careful not to drink any wine or intoxicating drink."

Hugh F. Fox, editor of the Peerscope, an anti-prohibition publication criticized the new bible for its manner in reference to wine.

POLING TO LEAD CHURCH SERVICES

Rev. Charles S. Poling of Ridgeway, Pa., will be leader and speaker at a series of pre-Easter services to be held at the First Presbyterian church March 15 to April 5.

Rev. Mr. Poling occupies a prominent place among the preachers of the country. He is a brother of Rev. Dan Poling of Marble Collegiate Reformed church, New York city.

During the series, services will begin at 7:30 each night with the exception of Saturday. Afternoon services will be held on Tuesdays, Wednesdays, Thursdays and Fridays, beginning each time at 2 p. m.

The First Evangelical and First Presbyterian churches are joining in the services.

Rev. Mr. Poling leads his own singing, being a singer and song writer of considerable repute. He is the son of Rev. C. C. Poling, pastor of the First Evangelical church, Salem.

COOLIDGE TO CALL CONFERENCE

Washington, March 13.—President Coolidge believes recent developments abroad indicate an important change in the disarmament situation, tending to open the way for the calling of an arms conference by the United States.

The president will take up the question of a naval limitation conference in a serious way with Secretary Kellogg as soon as it is definitely ascertained whether the league of nations conference project has been abandoned.

So far, however, no steps in that direction have been taken here and there is no change in the actual situation here.

As to the time of holding the conference the president is said to favor the near future, but he, of course, is not able under the circumstances to fix a date.
