DEATH RECALLS DEEDS OF DARING OF SAM DREBEN

El Paso, Texas, March 16.—Friends of Sam B. Dreben, soldier of fortune and war hero, who died at Hollywood, Cal., yesterday, recalled today that his last exploit here was his attempt, along with other El Pasoans, to capture "Little Phil" Anguta, alleged murderer in Juarez. Their plans progressed until "Little Phil" made such an outcry that the party of Americans, including Police Officer of Los Angeles, Claude Smith, former chief of detectives of El Paso, and a man who was called "Dr. Koley," was arrested and placed in the Juarez jail where a mob gathered and threatened to storm the prison and get the officers. They were later escorted safely across the bridge.

Major Richard F. Burges, one of El Paso's most prominent attorneys, once Dreben's officer overseas, told the story of one of Dreben's exploits overseas last night.

"On the morning of the 5th of October, 1918, the division received its fire baptism. Ordered to drive the enemy from the heights of St. Etienne and to push him beyond the Alsace, the soldiers of the 71st brigade, killed and captured the enemy machine gun detachment on the right front of the American line and immediately in front of the French. Dreben did not wait to consult a superior officer for orders. Calling for volunteers he instantly charged the enemy, killed and captured the detachment and captured four machine guns. He returned without the loss of a man. For this exploit, he was awarded the distinguished service cross and the French commander, realizing his service to his own command, conferred on him the medal de militaire, the highest decoration known to the French army."

"On the afternoon of the same day he received a full platoon of the enemy endeavoring to relieve a machine gun detachment on the right front of the American line and immediately in front of the French. Dreben did not wait to consult a superior officer for orders. Calling for volunteers he instantly charged the enemy, killed and captured the detachment and captured four machine guns. He returned without the loss of a man. For this exploit, he was awarded the distinguished service cross and the French commander, realizing his service to his own command, conferred on him the medal de militaire, the highest decoration known to the French army."

After getting the right number and completing her conversation she remarked that it also would be her last encounter with the device.

He was alone in the field and it was some time before he could get to the house. Dr. Beauchamp of Stayton was called and he was given all the medical aid possible. He is believed to be well on the road to recovery.

F. E. Pricie, soil expert of the Oregon Agricultural college extension service, was present and lectured before Surprise grange, Saturday afternoon, March 14. His subject was "Fertilization and Drainage." It was a very instructive lecture and one that was of benefit to all who heard it. One of the principal points emphasized in his talk was the development of the soil to get the largest cash returns. He said that it was not practical to organize drainage districts unless several hundred acres were to be drained, and that if the individual owner was to put in his own tile it should be laid out so that when completed it would form a complete system. In the matter of fertilization he dealt principally with the various kinds produced on the farm. He cautioned the farmers particularly not to burn straw, but to spread it on the land and plow it under. The entire lecture was full of practical hints of value to the farmer.

FRANKLIN HIGH PLAYER IS HIGH SCORE WINNER

Claire Scallan, star basketball player of the Franklin high school quintet of Portland, was high point man of the state tournament held at the Willamette university. Scallan, who was elected captain of the all-state team, placed first in points garnered with 45. Wesley Ellis, who also placed on the star team, was second with 23 points and John Drager, another Salem player to win a position on the all-state team, was third with 28. Miller of the McMinnville team, was fourth with 27 points. He was high man for the number of points in one game with a total of 29 gained in the game with the Arago team. Heenan, Salem forward, was fifth with 25 points. Heenan had hard luck all through the tournament and really should have been placed on the all-star team. He probably would have won a position had he played the brand of ball that he all through the season and is capable of.

The rest of the men in the tournament dropped way down although Lawrence, center for the Franklin team, had a total of 15 points. Milligan of Eugene, who placed on the all-state team in the guard position, was tied with Emmons, also of Eugene, with 14 points. Epps of the Franklin five gathered 11. Grant of McMinnville, Doyle of Arago was next with 8 points and Ashby of Salem was a close follower with 7. Chastain of Medford scored 6 points while the rest of the players were down the list with five points or less. Some of the players were low as they were only able to play in one game, their team being eliminated. The Salem team as a whole gathered a total of 193 points in the tournament.
