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LONDON HAS NEW SCANDAL TRIAL

London, Mar. 17.—Another "mystery" case involving persons of high rank, came up before a British court today when the suit of Mrs. Muriel Waterhouse against Sir David Wilson-Barker, Lady Wilson-Barker and Sheldon to trial after counsel at the judge's request had vainly tried to effect out of court a settlement of the affair, the mere mention of which Justice Montagu Sherman said was a "scandal."

One of the features of the case, which was merely docketed as one involving fraudulent misrepresentation was the declaration of Mrs. Waterhouse's counsel that Lady Wilson-Barker was the principal defendant and that Sir David, who is a noted naval expert and geographer was made a defendant because he is legally liable for her wrong-doing.

Outlining the case counsel said the victim of the alleged conspiracy was the late Alfred Francis Waterhouse, son of a wealthy family, who first met Lady Wilson-Barker at Harrogate, the fashionable watering place in 1914. His widow was now seeking, counsel said, to recover money extorted from him. She alleges that Lady Wilson-Barker secured large sums of money from a Waterhouse through fraudulent representations with Sheldon.

Discussing the character of the case, which was barely outlined, counsel said it was one of a kind "which of late has been too common."

"If it represents in any way the normal state of English society," he added, "then I am tempted to think, with exposure after exposure that strengthening the law is the only remedy. But I am sure it does not represent anything but a very exceptional case."

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REPORTS UPON SCHOOL STRIKE IN ALSACE VARY

Strasbourg, France, March 17.—(By Associated Press.)—Conflicting claims are made regarding the extent of the Catholic school strike which was called throughout Alsace by the bishop of Strasbourg in protest against the Herriot government's institution of interconfessional or religious neutral schools.

The Catholic newspapers and authorities say it was a great success while the socialists term it a failure.

The strike was called for only one day, yesterday in the country and for three days at Colmar, where it is continuing.

The Catholic newspapers assert that in the country the movement from 80 to 90 per cent effective and that in some villages not a single pupil attended. The governmental newspapers point to the smaller percentage of absences in the cities, which the Catholics admit. The latter, however, say that from 50 to 60 per cent of all the Catholic school children in Alsace observed the strike.

Japanese Envoy Says
Mission One of Peace

Washington, March 17.—Reports that Tsuno Matsudaira, the new Japanese ambassador to Washington, had received instructions before leaving Tokyo to re-

open the immigration question upon his arrival here, was denied today by the envoy.

His instructions, the ambassador said, were purely of a general character designed to promote friendship between the two governments.

He added, however, that although the immigration question was regarded in the United States as settled forever, hope was still entertained in Japan that at some future date the problem might be taken up again and another solution found acceptable to both Tokyo and Washington.

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
