

SALEM TOSSERS COMPLETE FINE SEASON RECORD

Thirteen points is all that separates the high point man of the Salem high school team and the man in third place, so close was the race between the men. Salem is not an individual team as the results show, most of the men depending on the team work in scoring.

Salem played a total of 26 games not including the state tournament which is one of the heaviest schedules in seasons and one of the toughest in the state. Salem met most of the recognized leaders in the valley and although they met some easy teams in their district they also met some of the strongest. They defeated every team they met except Franklin High of Portland, who won over them by one point when the referee called a foul on the crowd which decided the game, otherwise it would have gone into an extra period. They also lost to the Ashland team by a score of 30 to 25, but returned the favor by defeating them two games on the Ashland floor. The Chemawa Indians won over them by one point. The high school should have won that game as they were five points to the good with only a minute and a half to go but the Indians started a rally with the final score rimming the basket several times before going in.

In the other games they defeated Silverton twice by score of 39 to 7 and 51 to 7. The alumni was defeated after three overtime periods by a score of 39 to 37. They won over Lincoln high of Portland 23 to 22, Ashland 23 to 20 and 25 to 26, Newberg 23 to 15 and 23 to 11, West Linn 29 to 19 and 23 to 12, Dallas 23 to 13 and 33 to 13. They took the independence quintet into camp by scores of 21 to 8 and 23 to 13. Eugene 23 to 21, Corvallis 29 to 18 and 24 to 17, McMinnville 25 to 8 and 21 to 19, and also defeated the Willamette freshmen by scores of 33 to 24 and 23 to 16. They also played another Willamette team winning that by a score of 41 to 24. Altogether the team totaled a score of 734 points against their opponents 423. These figures do not include the games played in the state tournament.

Ellis was high point man of the year with a total of 290 markers to his credit. John Drager came second with 190 and Heeman third with 187. The others dropped way down with Ashby the next highest man scoring 57 points. The guards are not depended on to score which accounts the low score for them. Bob Drager scored 40, Duffy 14, Nash 13, Honeim 11, Glinger 10, Lyons 8 and Larson 4.

Homestead Lands Opened.
Washington, March 17.—Classification orders published by the interior department designated 50,000 acres in Arizona, Idaho and Washington as non-irrigable and declared they were open to homestead entries. Nearly 150,000 acres in Idaho, New Mexico and Utah were listed under the stock raising homestead law and designated for entry in tracts of 640 acres or less.

Gasoline Price Reduced.
Omaha, Neb., March 17.—The price of gasoline at all stations operated by the Peoples Gas company will be reduced today from 16.9 cents a gallon to 15.9 cents. H. M. Michels, manager announced. Gasoline at other stations has sold at 18 cents per gallon. Increased volume of business has made possible the reduction, Michels said.
