38 YEARS MAY BE ADDED TO M'COY'S TERM IN PRISON

Los Angeles, Cal., March 17.—Kid McCoy, former pugilist recently sentenced to San Quentin for the slaying of Mrs. Theresa Mora here last August today faced the prospect of having 38 years of imprisonment added to his term for manslaughter.

McCoy will be sentenced Friday at which time, if Judge Craft sees fit to assess the penalties consecutively the former globe trotting prize fighter will be burdened with a possible additional term of 38 years.

The jury deliberated 75 hours before returning a verdict, acquitted McCoy on four other counts charging robbery.

SALEMITES TELL TALE OF DEFUNCT APARTMENT DEAL

Prominent residents of Salem have one after another ascended the witness stand in the case of Carl Linde, architect of Portland against the defunct Capital Apartments company in which Linde is endeavoring to secure an architect's fee he alleges is due him for plans for the building which never was built and never will be.

State Treasurer T. B. Kay, James G. Helms, Homer H. Smith, F. E. Thielson, C. Van Dusen, contractor, were among those to take the witness stand today in making a defense against the claims of Linde.

It developed in the testimony that Warren Armstrong, promoter who put over the Capital Apartments as far as they went, but since has left for other scenes of endeavor, was seeking a life berth from the company, as well as the \$5 a share which he was to receive for all of the stock he sold.

Homer Smith and James G. Helms, attorney, both testified that Armstrong frequently approached them about his desire to be manager of the apartment house when it was completed.

PAVEMENT TO BE LAID FOR 3 MILES

Three miles of pavement will be added to the stretch already started from Stayton toward Mehama, according to a decision which has been reached by the county court.

This will bring the pavement at the end of the summer to within about three miles of Mehama. It is probable that this gap will be closed the following year.

By bringing the pavement to Mehama, the next pavement on the way to Gates, for a distance of about nine miles, will be up to 1300 county, as at Mehama the road swings over the Santiam into Linn county and remains in that county for about 9 miles before turning back into Marion.

County Judge Hunt received word from Mill City today that a new scarifier had been purchased by the district there and put holes in the road it that vicinity are rapidly being smoothed out.

Corvallis, Ore., March 17.—M. S. Woodcock, a pioneer of Benton county, regent of the Oregon Agricultural College and president of the First National bank of this city, died here early this morning as the result of a stroke of paralysis.
