

### CHECK ARTIST IN JAIL HERE ALSO WANTED ON COAST

Eddie Running, being held here to answer to charges of passing about \$200 in worthless checks on Silverton merchants, is wanted in Tillamook as well, according to word received by Sheriff Bower from Tillamook officers. Advice is to the effect that he is wanted at Tillamook if nothing is done about the case at this time, or if he is convicted and sentenced here he is wanted for prosecution there after completion of his sentence.

Running lived at Hebo in the Tillamook country for a time before moving to Silverton and it is thought he passed his worthless checks in the Tillamook section at that time. Just to what extent he operated there is not told in the advice to Sheriff Bower, it being merely stated that a warrant is being held there for him charging him with obtaining money by false pretense.

Myron January, another bad check artist, who operated here several months ago and served a term in the county jail here because of such operations, is in jail in Benton county, according to word received here by Sheriff Bower. It is stated that January was arrested in Eugene for Benton county officers, his alleged bad check work in Benton county having been pulled off at Philomath, according to the information reaching Salem.

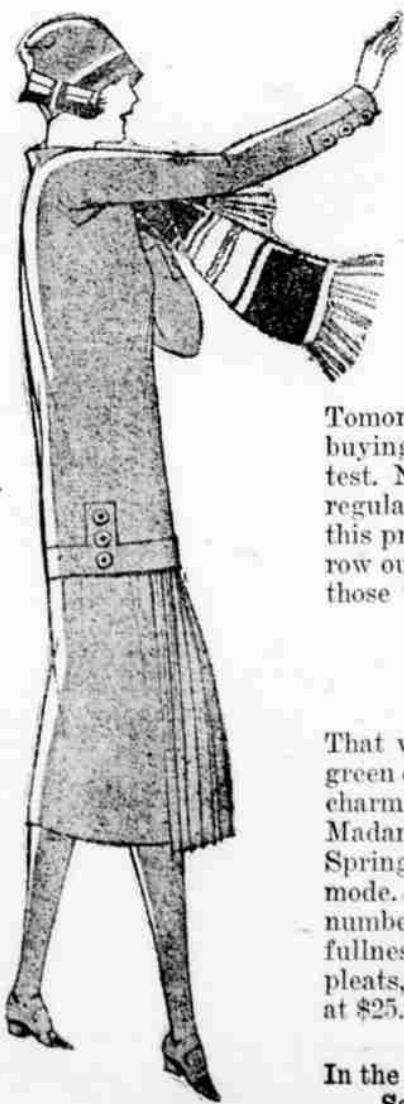
