

MOST TOWNS HIT IN PROSPEROUS FARM, MINE AREA

Chicago, March 19.—(By Associated Press.)—Most of the towns in Illinois and Indiana which suffered from the tornado of Wednesday are in prosperous areas, and are known for their farming and mining industries, fruit growing sections and dairying. Modern buildings, in most towns but recently constructed, up-to-date mines, including the Orient mine, the largest producing pit in the world, which recently established a coal mining country, and likewise destroyed, adding thousands of dollars to an unestimated property damage.

Murphysboro, the county seat of Jackson county, has a population of 10,073, is located about 60 miles north of Cairo in the heart of a dairy farming district and fruit growing country.

West Frankfort, is the center of a coal mining country, and likewise is not far from Cairo, but is closer to Herrin, the scene of much trouble in recent months. West Frankfort, however, is located in Franklin county. It has a population of 5,478.

Poseyville, Ind., is a noted trading point in Posey county, and is located on the Chicago & Eastern Illinois and Illinois Central railways. It has a population of 880. Princeton, in Gibson county, is a prominent station stop on the Chicago & Eastern Illinois and Southern railway. Many factories and a railroad shop are located here.

HATCHERY SITE ON UMPQUA FIXED

Roseburg, Or., March 19.—Ground is being staked today for the proposed new commercial salmon hatchery, which the state fish commission proposes to locate on the North Umpqua at Rock creek. When the North Umpqua hatchery was abandoned last year, the commission planned on a hatchery at Winchester, expecting to put in a great show place, which being on

the highway would attract the attention of tourists to the fishing industry. The high water during the winter, however, proved this location impractical.

The hatchery will be located on Rock creek, with the racks across the main river. Fresh running water with gravity flow will be available for the hatching and rearing troughs and for the feeding ponds, the water being taken from Rock creek. It is planned by the commission to expend about \$15,000 the first year on buildings, equipment and improvements.

RED CROSS GOES TO ASSISTANCE OF RUINED AREA

Washington, March 19.—The American Red Cross relief facilities were put into operation in force today in efforts to relieve the sufferers from the storm which wrought havoc in the middle west yesterday.

Reports reaching headquarters here from field workers showed supplies, doctors and nurses proceeding to the scenes of the worst havoc from many points.

With the co-operation of the Missouri Pacific railroad special trains are carrying tents and relief workers from St. Louis to Gorham, Ill., and Annapolis, Mo.

A group of relief workers, doctors and nurses in charge of Henry Baker, national director of disaster relief of the Red Cross, was sent to Murphysboro, Ill. Another group of workers is proceeding from Washington to Princeton, Ind., and F. E. Burleson, with nurses and medical supplies, is on his way to West Frankfort, Franklin county, by special train.

VANCOUVER HOST TO THOUSANDS ON 100TH BIRTHDAY

Vancouver, Wash., March 19.—This city is celebrating today the 100th anniversary of the founding of Port Vancouver, which in the early part of the last century was the headquarters of the Hudson Bay company in the "Oregon country"—all that vast territory between the Rock mountains on the east and the Pacific ocean on the west and between California on the south and the Russian colony in Alaska on the north.

Ground will be broken this afternoon for the construction of a stockade to reproduce the old fort, which was the headquarters of civilization in the Pacific northwest in the days before the immigration of the 40's.

The old fort will form the center of the 1925 centennial celebration which is planned to be held here. Charles H. French, manager of the fur trade district of British Columbia for the Hudson Bay company is to take part in the ground breaking ceremonies this afternoon.

A parade will be part of the ceremonies and tonight there will be a banquet at which Governor Roland B. Hartley of Washington, Governor Walter M. Pierce of Oregon and other leading officials and citizens of the Pacific northwest will be present or represented.
