

NEW AIRPLANE CARRIER TO TAKE TO WATER SOON

Washington, Mar. 20.—A new naval giant will take her first dip at Camden, N. J., April 7, when the first line airplane carrier Saratoga slides off the ways of the New York ship building corporation. When completed and commissioned with the fleet, some time late in 1926, she will be the biggest and fastest craft of the kind in the world, and will carry a fleet of 12 combat, observation and bombing planes.

Mrs. Curtis D. Wilbur, wife of the naval secretary, will act as sponsor for the big ship at the christening ceremonies.

Laid down as one of six battle cruisers under the 1915 building program, the Saratoga was converted under the arms limitation treaty with her sister ship, the Lexington, also to be launched in the near future, into an aircraft carrier before her construction was very far advanced.

As redesigned the Saratoga will be 588 feet long over all, with a maximum beam of 105 feet and a flying deck reaching from stem to stern, a clear sweep, with the exception of the smokestack and navigation bridge huddled to the extreme starboard side amidship in order to leave full room for the landing of planes. She will carry eight 8-inch rifles, built of size for ships of her type under the treaty, will have a displacement of about 20,000 tons and a speed of between 23 and 24 knots. She will be driven by electric motors, the power being generated by steam turbines of 140,000 horsepower.

There is no counterpart for this first American first line carrier in any other navy.

FORMER OREGON SENATOR IS DEAD

Portland, Or., March 20.—Malcolm A. Moody, U. S. ex-representative in congress from the eastern Oregon district, died at a hospital here last night.

Moody's home was in The Dalles. He came to Portland early in November.

A pioneer resident of The Dalles, Moody once served as mayor. He had large property holdings in Wasco county. He was elected to congress in 1896. The Cello canal was built largely through his efforts. His father, Z. F. Moody was governor of Oregon from 1882 to 1886.

Moody was born in Linn county, near the present town of Brownsville, in November 1855. The family moved to The Dalles in 1862, where Z. F. Moody organized The Dalles city bank.

Two brothers, Zenae A. Moody of Ashland, Or., and Ralph Moody an attorney at Washington, D. C., survive.

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NOT IN THE COMBINE

DEFENSE RESTS IN DENNISTOWN RECOVERY SUIT

London, March 20.—The defense in the Dennistown case rested today after Mrs. Dorothy Muriel Dennistown had been recalled to testify regarding bills for dresses purchased in Paris.

She is suing her former husband, Lieutenant Colonel Ian Oswald Dennistown for money she alleges she loaned him prior to their divorce in 1921. After the divorce he married the widow of the Earl of Carnarvon.

The court said it proposed to submit to the jury several questions regarding the agreement which Mrs. Dennistown said the colonel made in Paris at the time of their divorce, notably whether the agreement actually existed, whether it was collusive, whether both parties intended to give it legal effect, and whether any of its conditions had been already fulfilled.

Arguments are expected to occupy today and part of Monday.

Norman Birkett, arguing for the defense, told the jury the action had been brought because Mrs. Dennistown saw an opportunity of getting money from Colonel Dennistown, whom counsel described as "about as weak and vacillating an infatuated man as this jury ever heard of or read of."

"Now that the story is out, the contention of the defendant that was, in plain terms, blackmail, will be abundantly justified."

Sir Edward Marshall-Hall, principal counsel for the defense, has been forced to retire from the case because of illness, it was announced.

VANCOUVER PREPARES CENTENNIAL PLANS

Vancouver, Wash., March 20.—Plans for a centennial exposition here July 4 to August 4, to commemorate the founding of Fort Vancouver in 1825 were formally launched here yesterday in a celebration which included breaking ground for a reproduction of the old fort, a parade and a banquet last night attended by more than 100 men from all parts of the Pacific northwest.

Speakers at the afternoon exercise and the banquet included Governor Roland H. Hartley of Washington and Governor Walter M. Pierce of Oregon.

KING TRAVELS IN SECRET

Paris, March 20.—The seclusion of the British royal party's trip across the country to the Mediterranean for King George's convalescence cruise has revived the once familiar wartime date line "somewhere in France."

The king asked, that because of his ill health, the strictest incognito be maintained so he would not have to acknowledge greetings as the royal train sped through the French authorities zealously guarded the train schedule from the public.
