

PLAN TO REVIVE BALL CLUB HERE COMING SEASON

First definite plans for a Salem Senators ball club were laid last night at a meeting of several business men who are interested in forming a team for the city of Salem. The team has been a part of the Salem entertainment during the summer for the last several years and prospects for a better and bigger year this season are bright. With the announcement that Biddy Bishop, manager of the club last year, would not be here for the playing season this year, gave several people the idea that the Salem Senators were a thing of the past.

Plans for the entering of the inter-state league were talked over at the meeting last night and it is thought likely that the fans will see some of the best games they have witnessed for several years. Last year the Senators played independent ball and in several of the games the fans were disappointed in the showing of the other club. As it is now planned six teams will be entered for a season which will start April 12th and finish July 19th.

Two leagues are in Portland now and it would be almost impossible to get good games if they depended on getting games from week to week. In the opinion of "Frisco" Edwards and several others who attended the meeting last night, the league has an opening for another club and would give Salem the chance to join. The other members of the league would be Hillsboro, Camas, winners of the inter-state league last year, Oregon City, Vancouver and the Luckenbach Ship Co. The only team that might have a strong aggregation would be the Vancouver nine. The others all have strong teams and the Vancouver team is out after good players. This would give Salem a definite playing schedule and assure the fans of good games nearly every Sunday at home. The Vancouver and Luckenbach Ship company are local teams which will allow Salem to have eleven out of fifteen games at home. The first three out of five would be away from home and then Salem would have only one game on the road out of the next ten.

The biggest thing now will be the securing of funds for the carrying on of the club. Last year Biddy Bishop secured several business men to sign a pledge to donate five dollars a month for five months. This amount is planned this year and would give the fans better games than they got last year.

A board of directors was elected to act temporarily at the meeting last night. Those elected last night were Todd Shelton, Clifford W. Brown, Joe Adolph, Cuyler Van Patten, August Hueston, George H. Riches and Carl Gabrielson. This board of directors will appoint a field captain who will manage the team. "Frisco" Edwards, receiver for the club last year will more than likely be the choice. The directors will handle all of the money and pay the players and all other bills. A practice will be held at Oxford park tomorrow afternoon at 2 o'clock, anyone interested is invited to come out and see the boys hither up.

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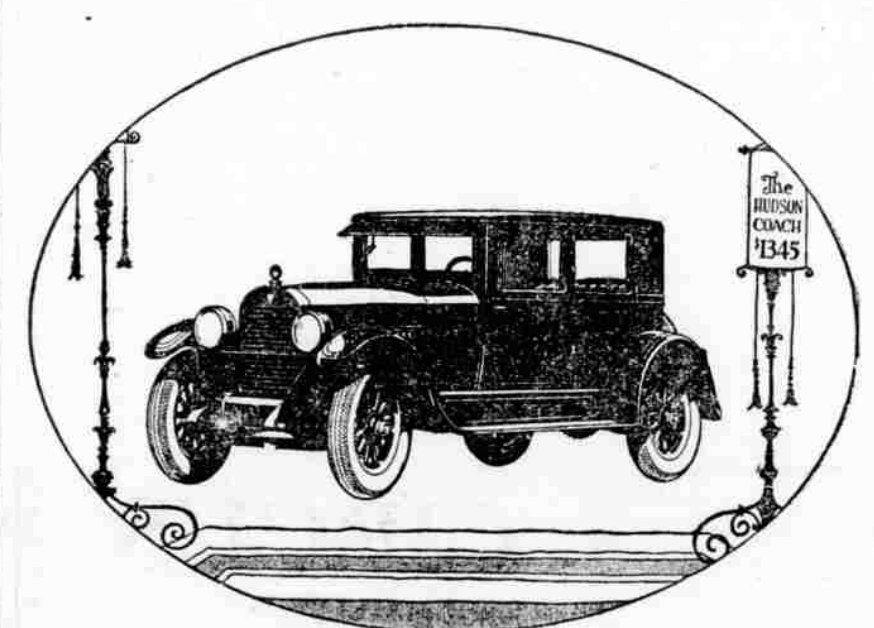
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
