State Meet To Be Here June 12-13

The annual state convention of the Oregon federation of business and professional women's clubs will be held in Salem on Friday and Saturday, June 12 and 13, according to arrangements made by the Salem club and the state president, Mrs. Alice B. Maloney, of Marshfield, when she visited here this week.

Two official delegates from each of the nine affiliated chapters in the state, Portland, Corvallis, Eugene, Medford, Marshfield, Hood River, Astoria, Albany and Salem, will be the voting body at the conference and will elect officers of the state federation. Local groups at Klamath Falls, Bendleton and Roseburg, may join the federation before the June convention.

The executive committee meeting on the evening of June 12 will officially open the conference. A business meeting of all delegates and members who wish to attend will probably be held Saturday morning with a luncheon at noon. A banquet Saturday evening will close the session. At this time a speaker representing the national organization will address the Oregon members.

This will be the first time that a state convention has been held outside of Portland. Dr. Mary B. Purvine heads the Salem club which has membership of nearly a hundred.
