

### GREAT CLAIMS ARE MADE FOR NEW ANTISEPTIC

Baltimore, Md., Mar. 22.—Dr. Vender Leonard, chairman of the common internal antiseptic, national research council, explained further before the Baltimore Medical Society last night the action of hexyresorcinol, the antiseptic which he recently discovered. The new drug has been described as fifty times more effective than carbolic acid in its power to kill disease germs in the genito-urinary tract.

While the antiseptic is an irritant to the stomach and had been administered with olive oil in capsule form, Dr. Leonard declared it to be non-irritating to the genito-urinary tract. He described his discovery as potentially germicidal, soluble to a high degree and capable of being eliminated in high percentages by the kidneys.

The effect of hexyresorcinol, Dr. Leonard said, was to combine at once with the secretion of the kidneys and to render those secretions, when acid in character, themselves antiseptic. The power of the drug is destroyed, Dr. Leonard said, when the kidney secretions are alkaline.

Dr. Leonard presented reports of cases in which he said the new antiseptic had been used. Several types of germs best known as producers of pus and irritation—staphylococcus, streptococcus and bacillus coli—Dr. Leonard declared, had been successfully combated. The first named two types, he said, were conquered after treatment ranging from two to nine days, although the third, peculiar to the large intestine required more patient effort.

### 40 PERCENT OF DEAD CHILDREN

West Frankfort, Ill., Mar. 22.—(By Associated Press)—One of the most striking features of the torments here was the large proportion of women and children killed.

More than 1500 coal miners were at work beneath the surface in the devastated area and thus escaped injury or death.

Nearly forty per cent of the dead in West Frankfort were small children. One of the most heart touching scenes after the disaster was the long row in the morgue of little bodies from which life had been snuffed out almost in the twinkling of an eye.

West Frankfort and other storm-stricken communities in Franklin county today went about grim task of burying the bulk of their dead. Of the 163 known dead in the county virtually all had been identified and funeral arrangements made.

### GIBBONS ASKS \$200,000 TO FIGHT HARRY WILLS

Chicago, March 23.—Eddie Kane, manager of Tom Gibbons, has demanded a flat guarantee of \$200,000 for Gibbons to host Harry Wills, negro heavyweight challenger, in a show for the Italian hospital fund in New York, June 19. Gibbons terms were made known in a telegram replying to an offer which Kane said he received from Herbert J. Fugatey of New York.

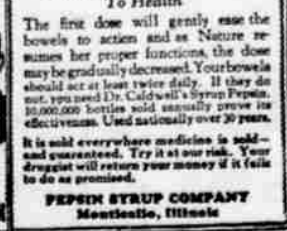

### CHEMICAL GIVES BROCCOLI FROST RESISTING POWER

Honolulu, Mar. 22.—Experiments with various kinds of fertilizers on broccoli have resulted in the accidental discovery of a chemical which imparts frost resistance to plants. It was announced this morning by County Agent B. W. Cooney. In experimenting at Winstons a trial plot upon which super phosphate was used it was found to have some through the extreme cold of the past winter with absolutely no loss from the extreme low temperature, while in every direction around it, there was a 50 per cent kill. On another tract on which a combination fertilizer was used, and in which phosphate was carried in a lesser piece, frost resistance was also manifest. Broccoli grows in Douglas county lost over a quarter of a million dollars this year, when over nine tenths of the crop was killed by frost, and if the use of phosphates will prevent such damage in the future, as the county agent states he is positive it will do, the discovery will be of untold value in future years.

A series of exhaustive tests will be made in the colder sections of the county next winter to test out the frost resisting qualities.
