HUBBARD CORN GROWER SCORES

L. B. Yoder, Hubbard, won the Oregon state newspaper at the national seed corn show at Chicago last week, according to advices reaching here today. Mr. Yoder took first place from among five competitors representing one country in the state.

The national seed corn show, in which Mr. Yoder won high honors, was the largest corn show the world has ever seen. Close to 50,000 growers had entries in the show, and \$17,000 in prizes was offered by the Sears-Roebuck agricultural foundation for the winning ears in the exhibit. Each ear was tested for germination, and the judges were ten of the outstanding corn authorities in America.

SILVERTON NEWS

Silverton, Or., March 23.—(Special.)—The last basketball game of the season to be played by the Silverton team was staged Friday night on the Silverton floor when the Silverton Legion defeated the Oregon City Firemen. The score was 49 to 26. The game was attended by the largest crowd of the season.

In the 18 games which the Silverton Legion has played this year the team has scored a total of 539 points against 221 of their opponents. 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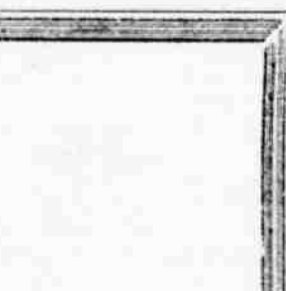
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SILVERTON HILLS CLUB PLANS HOME OF ITS OWN

The school districts whose communities would be united in the project are Davis, Porter, Coberly, Fruit and Bridge Creek.

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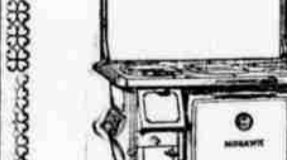
