HARDING MEMORIAL STAMPS IN DEMAND

Washington, March 24.—Sales of the new Harding 1 1/2-cent postage stamp and the new 1-cent envelope on March 19, the first day of their offering at the postoffice department's philatelic agency amounted to \$2446, representing about 150,000 pieces. The sales were to stamp collectors who bought in blocks of six, twelve, and even 100. Many asked that 1 1/2-cent Washington stamped envelopes, bearing in addition 1 1/2-cent Harding stamps of the three methods of manufacture—coil, rotary press and flat bed press—be mailed to them so as to bear the cancellation date of the first day of sale.
