

GIBBONS TO BOX TUNNEY JUNE 12 IF PLANS HOLD

Chicago, March 26.—A fifteen-round bout to a decision between Tommy Gibbons of St. Paul and Gene Tunney, American light heavyweight, to be held in the Polo Grounds in New York, June 12, was the objective of a meeting here today between Jimmy DeForest, matchmaker of the Polo Athletic club of New York, and Eddie Kane, manager of Gibbons.

Gibbons has been offered 20 per cent of the receipts, Kane said, and Tunney has reached an understanding with DeForest, New York dispatches indicate, but no contracts have been signed.

Kane will sign for the contest at once, he said, if DeForest's terms are satisfactory without waiting for further moves in the proposed match between Gibbons and Harry Wills, negro heavyweight challenger, for the milk fund show in New York, May 28.

The St. Paul boxer's manager also has under consideration a \$50,000 offer for a ten-round Gibbons-Tunney no decision contest in St. Paul early in June, made by Jack Reddy, St. Paul promoter.

Gibbons will be an interested ringside spectator at the bout Friday night in St. Paul between Tunney and Harry Greb, world's middleweight champion, and former light heavyweight titlist from whom Tunney won his crown.

RECORD OF CLUB WORK FOR YEAR IS DISTRIBUTED

J. A. Churchill, state superintendent of schools, is now distributing to county superintendents and supervisors of industrial education the annual edition of the Red Book, which contains a record of the achievements of boys and girls in industrial club work.

Contained in the booklet are the stories of boys and girls who were first prize winners at the state and the international fairs. In the foreword Superintendent Churchill says:

"We believe this club work to be one of the most important movements in modern education. It is a potent method of character development."

"To begin a worthy project and carry it through to completion is, in itself, an example of persistence and determination worthy of emulation by older citizens. It teaches the dignity of labor and the economic value of the best method of accomplishment. It encourages thrift and self-reliance. It develops good judgment and an appreciation of excellence whether of one's own work or that of others. Its competitive feature instills a spirit of fair play and good sportsmanship."

"We recommend this work to the school children of Oregon, and should like to see every boy and girl in the state having an aptitude for club work, especially in the rural schools, engaged in some project of club work."

DOG ORDINANCE TO BE ENFORCED

Having been beset many a time and oft in recent weeks by irate neighborhood committees who have complained about dogs running at large, demolishing gardens and flower beds and raising havoc in chicken yards, Mayor Giesy and Chief of Police Minto announce that the dog ordinances of Salem are going to be enforced to the letter.

Under the dog ordinances the authorities have two alternatives, to impound the dogs or to arrest the owners. For a long time they have been chasing down the dogs, but, in the words of the mayor, "we have gotten nowhere. Now we are making a new start and are going to arrest the owners."

Arrest of an owner under the ordinance regulating dogs means a fine for the offense of allowing the dog to run at random about town. While the proposed strict enforcement of the ordinance may be embarrassing to the owners and an unpleasant duty for the officers, the mayor and the chief declare it is going to be enforced.

PLAINTIFFS IN TWO SUITS LOSE

Owens & Meek had a bad day of it in circuit court yesterday. They were plaintiffs in two separate cases, one against Gorton Bros., and another against J. R. O'Brien. The cases involved the sale of cash registers. The company seeking to collect from each of the defendants on a contract to purchase such cash registers. Gorton Bros. paid \$12.50 down on the register they bought and O'Brien paid \$15 down.

A jury in each case found not only for the defendants, relieving them from paying the balance for the cash registers, but gave Gorton Bros. \$12.50 back they had paid and O'Brien his \$15 back. The defendants claimed in their defense that the cash registers would not operate and were not up to the standard claimed for them.
