

COOLIDGE PUTS OKEE ON EFFORT TO MERGE RACES

Cincinnati, Ohio, Mar. 25.—The movement for adjustment of race relations was endorsed by President Calvin Coolidge in a letter read before the national inter-racial conference, which opened here last night. Addressed to George E. Haynes, secretary of the commission on the church and racial relations, the federal council of churches of Christian America, the letter read:

"The evidence of developing public opinion in support of cooperation among the racial groups in this country is a matter of satisfaction to all who have the nation's best interests at heart. The development of the inter-racial understanding through cooperative plans and the action of leaders of the races in local communities, has contributed largely to this increasing good will.

"I feel that the national inter-racial conference called to bring local leaders from many states to exchange experiences and compare policies and plans, is worthy of endorsement and support by all who are interested in effective adjustment of race relations.

"I send my wishes for success to the two commissions and to this inter-racial conference."

MILITARY TRAINING DEFENDED BY WEEKS

Washington, Mar. 25.—Military training would be worth every cent the country spends on it even if there were assurance of no more wars, Secretary Weeks declared in a paper read last night before the Association of Military Colleges and Schools.

"No more convincing evidence of this is needed," the secretary said, "than that the military schools and colleges are notably free from the many unbecoming theories, ideas and practices that thrive like choking weeds in some of our other educational institutions.

"The military colleges," Mr. Weeks added, "counterbalance many subversive influences and educational evils that are distinct American liabilities and others that must be classed as national risks, decidedly speculative in character and unlikely ever to be assuaged."

SHEPHERD MUST AWAIT TRIAL IN JAIL, IS RULING

Chicago, Mar. 25.—William D. Shepherd, charged with the murder of a boy being fattened for the slaughter, with Shepherd is a position to take his life and profit by it. The fight for his release will be carried to the supreme court with a petition for a writ of habeas corpus. William C. Stewart, his attorney said.

Meanwhile prosecution attorneys and Stewart cannot agree on the date for arraignment of Shepherd. Assurance of a speedy trial if Steward waives it was held out for him in Judge Hopkin's decision, rendered after three days of testimony and argument.

The whole question in the ball hearing, the decision said, rested on the testimony of Charles C. Faiman, head of a science school and jointly indicted with Shepherd to whom he said he gave typhoid fever germs, knowing they were to be used on McClintock.

"If Faiman is telling the truth, there was a conspiracy to murder this boy," said the ruling. "If Faiman is not, this defendant has been the subject of a monstrous injustice. He has been enmeshed in a net of circumstances unappreciated and painful to contemplate, but it is not for the court to decide in a hearing of this nature."

The decision came a few minutes after Stewart had closed a reply to the argument of Robert S. Crowe, state's attorney.
