50 ATTENDING MISSIONARY BODY SESSION

Silverton, Or., March 27.—(Special.)—At the annual business meeting of the woman's missionary federation which is being held at Silverton this week, Mrs. M. G. POLK FARMERS FIGHT GROUND SQUIRREL PEST

Dallas, Mar. 27.—Polk county farmers are going after the ground squirrels in dead earnest this year if their purchases of poison grain are any indication. A batch of 1500 pounds was prepared in Polk county late in February and this is practically exhausted, according to A. W. Moore junior biologist of the United States biological survey, who arrived in Dallas today to mix another batch.

The 1500 pounds of grain equalled the entire amount used in the county last season. A number of committees have organized districts and are setting out to exterminate the diggers before grain season arrives.
