

STUDENTS CHEER DEPARTING TEAM OFF FOR CHICAGO

A crowd estimated at more than 600, principally high school students, was on hand to give the Salem high school basketball team a rousing send-off as it left yesterday afternoon for Chicago to represent the state of Oregon in the 1925 national basketball tournament.

A special rally was held at the high school building at 3:30, following which the student body, with the team, went to the Oregon Electric depot from which the train left.

Standing on the rear platform of the last car as the train pulled out, the squad was greeted with cheers and yells from every hand. Pennants waved, cameras clicked, players smiled, and the train, gathering speed, passed out of sight taking with it the team which makes the longest trip of any of the many teams which are to vie for the championship of the United States in basketball.

The locals will arrive in Chicago Sunday, and leave the following Sunday.

A special meeting of the chamber of commerce has been called for tonight when D. M. Sanson, head of big eastern and Canadian linen industries, will put up a definite proposition to Salem business men as to what he will do in the line of establishing a linen plant here to care for a share of the Willamette valley grown flax. Mr. Sanson has agreed to put \$50,000 into the proposition himself. At tonight's meeting it is understood he will tell what he thinks the community should do.
