## FORD SURPLUS GAINS \$100,000,000 IN YEAR

Moston, Mass., March 28.—An increase of more than \$100,000,000 in the surplus of the Ford Motor company in the year ending this month is shown in a statement of condition filed by the company with the secretary of the commonwealth of Massachusetts. The statement places the present surplus at \$542,476,496.39 as against \$442,041,081.12 in March, 1924.

Supplementary articles were filed by the Crawford Furniture company of Pondleton, changing the name to McKee Furniture company.

**RELIEF IS PROMISED ON UMATILLA PROJECT**  
Substantial relief will be granted the settlers on the Umatilla reclamation project in the Hermiston district, according to W. A. Delsil, private secretary to Governor Pierce, who was a member of the board that investigated that project this week under a new federal statute.

The committee has not yet prepared its report, but it is said a moratorium, during which no payments need be made by the settlers and a change in the method of making payments are certain to be included in the recommendations. The latter will be a change from the fixed charge, which on the Umatilla project is \$5 a acre, to a charge of 5 per cent of the production per acre. Both the reclamation measures are authorized under the new federal law which is based on the report of the fact finders' commission.
