

KOZER PAYS OUT SINGLE WARRANT FOR \$2,173,852

Secretary of State Sam A. Kozar yesterday issued what was doubtless the biggest warrant in the history of the state, in the sum of \$2,173,852.50.

The secretary also issued a warrant for \$440,000 to cover the interest on \$20,000,000 of World War veterans' state aid bonds which become payable April 1.

Warrants also have been issued in favor of the county treasurers of the various counties of the state, distributing one-fourth of the motor vehicle license fees on account of the distribution made on March 15, 1925, which embraces the receipts from such sources from September 15, 1924, to March 15, 1925.

Interest on the retirement of road bond issue, then in preparing road-beds, bridges, etc., for the construction of state highways, and in the event provision has been made for the foregoing purposes then such funds may be used in the discretion of the county court in any other manner for general state improvement, however, within certain limitations.
