PERMIT SOUGHT FOR RESERVOIRS FOR POWER USES
Oscar Furuset of Portland has applied to the state engineering department for authority to construct Cause Creek reservoir for the storage of 30,000 acre feet of water from Cause creek and Walla Walla river, also for the construction of Dry creek reservoir for the storage of 20,000 acre feet from dry creek, and the appropriation of the stored water and water from Walla Walla river, and Cause creek, for the irrigation of 25,000 acres, development of power and domestic purposes.

Other applications that have been filed with the engineering department are:
C. L. Hazen of The Dalles, water from an unnamed spring for domestic purposes in Multnomah county, at a cost of \$120.
V. Cavilfield of Crane, water from Gunbarre creek for storage in a reservoir to be constructed and the appropriation of the stored water for irrigation of 150 acres in Harney county.

Horace R. Warner of Myrtle Point, water from a spring for domestic purposes in Coos county.
Mrs. Grace H. Palmer of Palmer, water from an unnamed spring for domestic irrigation in Multnomah county, at a cost of \$200 to \$300.
Alonso McDougall of Marshfield, water from two unnamed springs for domestic purposes in Coos county, at a cost of \$450.

George Adams of Nyam, water from Green's ranch and Stearns-Kinman & Co. waterway for irrigation of 140.59 acres in Malheur county, at a cost of \$1500.

The art exhibit at Lincoln school Wednesday and Thursday afternoon of this week has been a distinct financial success, according to school officials. More money was taken in at Lincoln school than at Highland and Englewood combined, where the exhibit was previously held. The money derived from the exhibit will be spent on pictures for the school rooms.

First, second and third prizes are to be awarded within each district, and between districts. Attendance of each Lion is counted, whether or not he attends his own club.

Brandons to Close Costly Engagement Here This Evening

Closing a three-day engagement that has been featured by exceptionally creditable performances and a discouraging lack of patronage, the Brandon Light Opera company will this evening present "The Chocolate Soldier" at the Grand Theater.

Indications at noon today were that the house will not be more than half filled, and that the company will leave Salem several hundred dollars in the hole as a result of its three-day visit. Thursday evening there were but 123 people in the audience, and last night the attendance was only 20 more to witness a splendid presentation of "Robin Hood," America's best loved comic opera.

There was the same praiseworthy excellence about last night's performance that has marked all of the productions staged here by the Brandons during their two engagements at the Grand—the same high quality of characterization and interpretation.

NEW YORK CLUBS ARE PADLOCKED
New York, March 25.—Exclusive memberships and careful scrutiny of applicants are failing to prevent federal padlockmen from entering "clubs" as post-voided cabarets on Broadway now are known.

Emery Buchner, started his career as federal district attorney by spending \$1400 of his own money, through lawyer friends, for champagne in restaurants. He has not revealed, however, just how he gets his men past husky licensed doorkeepers of gilded clubs in the roaring forties, nor how his agents identify applicants adequately to club attaches who scrutinize entrants through peep holes.

Anyhow his methods of getting evidence of the sale of liquor are such that the clubs usually consent to padlock decrees. Two places, the Club Moritz and the Club Borge were padlocked yesterday.
