FINE OF \$7000 IS ASSESSED ON RICKARD

Conspiracy To Violate Law Forbidding Interstate Shipment of Prize Fight Films Costly.

Newark, N. J., Mar. 30.—George L. ("Tex") Rickard, nationally known fight promoter today was fined \$7000 by Federal Judge Bodine for conspiracy to violate the law regarding illegal transportation of prize fight films.

All five men were in court to receive sentence. Fines were given the four other convicted men as follows:

Rickard, Quimby and Muma were fined \$7000 as each of the counts charging conspiracy and \$1000 each on each of the two counts charging transportation. Judge Bodine fined Hayes and Flournoy but \$1000 each as they were held to be employees of the leaders in the conspiracy.

SAYS COOLIDGE NOT SO SILENT

DIAMOND BROKERS LOSE \$50,000 IN FINE GEMS

New York, March 30.—Four men today raided the offices of Sobel & Kaleko, diamond brokers at 45 Maiden Lane, and escaped with unsold diamonds valued at between \$50,000 and \$100,000.

PERU SEEKS MORE LIGHT UPON AWARD

Amplification of Tacna-Arica Decision Asked; Fear Chilean Influence In Prebescite.

Washington, Mar. 30.—(By the Associated Press)—A communication asking for amplification of certain features of President Coolidge's Tacna-Arica arbitration award probably will be presented to the state department late today by Peru.

After calling attention to reports of Chilean atrocities that might affect the result of the fourth coming arbitrate in the province, the communication will suggest that a native constabulary be organized to replace the present Chilean garrisons in Tacna-Arica until after the election.

Note Courteous This will constitute the principal point to be covered in the representation which will be couched in courteous terms, calculated to give no offense to the American government or reflect on the integrity of President Coolidge as arbitrator.

Something of a sensation has developed over the note before hand because of the publication of erroneous reports that it already had been delivered to the state department secretly and that it was couched in language of unusual sharpness.

LABOR OPPOSED TO SOVIET PLAN

Boston, March 30.—The American Federation of Labor "defies" the soviet system of government and is opposed to recognition of the Russian communist regime, Matthew Woll, vice-president of the federation declared at a meeting in a public forum here last night.

BRENTANO RESIGNS AS MINISTER TO HUNGARY

Washington, March 30.—The resignation of Theodore Brentano as American minister at Budapest, Hungary, has been received by President Coolidge. While no decision has been announced, there is reason to believe that the resignation will be accepted.

Berlin, March 30.—(By Associated Press)—Final returns from yesterday's presidential election in Germany, announced this morning, show that none of the seven candidates received a majority, as required by the constitution, making a second election necessary.

Moscow, Idaho, Mar. 30.—William J. McConnell, former governor of Idaho, and father of the law of United States Senator William E. Borah, died at his home here early today at the age of 85 years.

DISMISSAL OF MURDER CASE ASKED

Defense Moves That Jury Be Instructed To Inquire Into Sanity of Dorothy Ellingson.

San Francisco, Mar. 30.—Judge Harold Luderback postponed today for 24 hours the murder trial of 16-year-old Dorothy Ellingson to inquire into the present mental condition of the girl who is charged with killing her mother in the bedroom of their home last January after a dispute over the girl, a surfeit of jazz and joy rides.

MITCHELL MAY BE ASSIGNED TO POST IN TEXAS

Washington, Mar. 30.—Brigadier General William Mitchell, assistant chief of the army air service, will be assigned on April 26 as air service officer of the Eighth corps area with headquarters at Fort Sam Houston, San Antonio, Texas.

EXHUMED BODIES SHOW NO TYPHOID

Chicago, March 30.—The exhumed bodies of Dr. Oscar Olson and Mrs. Emma Nelson McClintock, physician and mother of the "millionaire orphan," showed marked chronic heart disease, according to a report submitted today by Dr. James Simonds of Northwestern university, representing William D. Smeeth in the post-mortem.

MAN SNEEZES DRILL FROM NASAL TUBES

Philadelphia, March 30.—Suffering a perpetual headache and approaching blindness, the cause of which physicians were unable to determine, Harry M. Hutchison, an electrician, today sneezed from the nasal tubes an inch and a half piece of a quarter-inch steel drill with which he had been stabbed in the nose 12 years ago.
