PIONEER SALEM CONTRACTOR IS CALLED BY DEATH

Clarence Van Patten, pioneer resident of Salem, and for 25 years a prominent contractor of this city, died at his home Sunday morning. He had been ill since October, 1923. At the time of his death he was 67 years of age.

Mr. Van Patten came to Salem from Kansas in 1890, and entered the contracting business soon after his arrival here. He went into partnership with Ira Erb, the firm being known as Erb & Van Patten. The partnership continued for 15 years, or until the time of Erb's death, after which the firm continued under the name of Van Patten & Son.

During his life time Mr. Van Patten constructed a large number of buildings in and near Salem. He built the Polk county court house at Dallas, the Laja plant, which was originally a brewery at Salem, the Salem armory, the Derby-Lafky building, the girls' industrial school, the Willis building on Fifth street, the old plant for the King's Food Products company, the paper mill at Salem, the new Vick Bros. building, the new Salem hospital, the Eugene armory, Hendricks hall at the University of Oregon and a number of other buildings. He had charge of remodeling the Marlon hotel.

Mr. Van Patten is survived by his widow, a son, Guy Van Patten, a daughter, Miss Ruth Van Patten and three grandchildren, Robert and Mabel Van Patten and Edward Farrington.

The funeral will take place at 2:30 p. m. Tuesday. The body will be interred in the City View cemetery.

Grand Ronde Man Is Held For Grand Jury. Dallas, Or., March 26.—August Bannach of Grand Ronde was held to await action of the grand jury on a charge of contributing to the delinquency of a minor by decision of Justice of the Peace Cook, Saturday. The decision followed a preliminary hearing late Friday afternoon when the matter was taken under advisement.
