

WHEAT PRICE LOWEST IN FOUR MONTHS

MARKET CLOSES 12 CENTS UNDER SATURDAY MARK

Chicago, Mar. 29.—Wheat suffered a big break in value today just before the close. May delivery was advanced to \$1.44, a loss of 12¢. The close was wild, ranging all the way from \$1.47 to \$1.36 1/2.

FREIGHT RATES NOT TO ADVANCE

It is now announced that there will be no present advance in the rates on canned goods and dried fruits from Pacific Coast ports to European ports in direct water shipments, as was recently contemplated by some of the steamship lines, on account of an increase in cost of operation.
