

RADIO SIGNALS UNDERGROUND ARE HEARD FAR

Washington, March 30.—Announcement that he had succeeded in reaching the Pacific coast with radio signals from the underground transmitting set with which he has been experimenting for several years, was made here last night by Dr. James H. Rogers. His efforts to obtain reception of the waves from his underground station at Hyattsville, Md., near here, on the coast, after previously reaching points as far distant as New Mexico, were crowned with success last night, Dr. Rogers said, when he received a telegram from an amateur signal station operator at Los Angeles, saying the signals were "coming in finely."

The underground antennae used in the tests, in conjunction with a set of 350-watt tubes, consists of four cables, laid three feet underground and centering from different directions as the waves of the wheel. Dr. Rogers said he hoped to accomplish trans-oceanic broadcasting with a 600-foot cable antenna he intends to lay. He contends the earth crust is a more efficient medium for transmitting radio waves than the air.

EUGENE TOSSERS WIN IN TOURNEY

The inter-city basketball tournament of the Cascade and Pioneer clubs of Salem, Eugene and Portland was brought to a close Saturday afternoon with the Eugene team winning. Six teams were entered in all, two from each of the three cities. The division of the teams was made by the weight, the lighter teams being matched against each other. This is the first tournament of the series and it is thought that a larger one will be held next year, due to the support of the games this year.

In the preliminary games at the high school gymnasium, the Eugene Koolha Comrades defeated the Jason Lee team by 25 to 11 score. In the second game of the series the Portland Comrades defeated the Salem H-Y by a score of 11 to 7. This was the closest of the series. Up to the last minute or so the score was tied but two long shots by the Portlanders gave them the game.

In the afternoon games played on the Willamette floor, the Portland Junior comrades were defeated by the Eugene Comrade club by a score of 16 to 13. In the second game the Portland senior team was defeated by the Eugene senior five by a good score. This left both of the Eugene teams victorious. Bob Boardman, of the YMCA, was referee and Charles Hageman was score keeper.

MME. KERENSKY DIVORCED

Leiningrad, March 29.—(By Associated Press.) It was revealed today that Mme. Kerensky, wife of Alexander Kerensky, premier of the revolutionary government which succeeded the czarist regime, obtained a divorce in October, 1923, on the grounds of desertion.

The decree was issued by the holy synod, the highest clerical body in Russia.

Mrs. Kerensky is now living in Leiningrad, while her former husband is editing an anti-soviet newspaper in Prague, the Czechoslovakian capital.

BODIES ARE FOUND ON SCUTILED CRUISER

Scapa Flow, Orkney Islands, March 29.—Workmen engaged in rigging up a scuttled German destroyer, beached in Mill bay, have discovered under a mass of wood which completely concealed them, the bodies of five German officers and sailors, who evidently were not warned at the time the fleet was sunk by the German crews.

(The surrendered German fleet, including eleven battleships, five battle cruisers, six light cruisers and auxiliary craft, was scuttled by the German crews on June 21, 1919. The sinking came two days after the signing of the naval conditions of the peace treaty, restricting size of the German fleet.)
