ELKS TEMPLE IS TAKING SHAPE, READY BY JULY 1

With the removal early this week of the scaffolding used by workmen in finishing the exterior of the new \$200,000 Salem Elks temple, the fact has become evident to Salem residents that the new building is rapidly nearing completion. Those in charge of its construction have stated that the building will be finished inside and ready for occupancy by July 1.

The brick which forms the exterior of three sides of the temple has been variously described as buff, light brown and grayish brown. Stone slabs of light gray decorate the corners, windows and doors. The back wall is to be finished in the outside with stucco of a color to match the brick.

Practically all the plaster work on the inside of the building is expected to be finished this week. Some of the fancy work of finishing the rooms will be done later. One main factor in the time consumed to complete the work of the building will be the time taken to make concrete floors, members of the Elks building committee have stated. Floors will be of concrete, nearly all of them being covered with rubber tiling. The tiling cannot be laid until the floor becomes absolutely dry and hard.

The main entrance of the building, which opens north toward State street, leads into a vestibule with a coat room adjoining on the right and a waiting room on the left. A large card room and a lounge room measuring 54 by 26 feet have been built at the two front corners of the lower floor. A billiard room in the southwest corner measures 25 by 100 feet.

The secretary's office, the kitchen, pantries and stairs are located at the back center of the floor. A dining room, measuring 25 by 40 feet, is at the southeast corner. It will be possible to serve diners in the dining room or in the larger banquet room on the floor immediately above. A lift from the kitchen will take food to the second floor into a pantry which adjoins the banquet room.

At the east center of the first floor a women's rest room has been built. Entrance to the women's room may be had from Cottage street on the east. Another women's room has been built at the northeast corner of the upper floor. The banquet room measures 52 by 70 feet and has a large stage at its south end.

The lodge room at the southwest corner measures 52 by 70 feet, and has a platform at its south end. The lined moving picture projection rooms have been built high up at the north end of both the banquet and lodge rooms. An ante room, a candidate's room and a store room are built north of the lodge room. A small balcony has been made beside the projection room.

UNIVERSITY TO OPEN MUSIC HALL SUNDAY

University of Oregon, Eugene, April 1.—(Special)—Formal dedication of the newly-completed school of music auditorium at the University of Oregon will take place Saturday and Sunday with a large number of out-of-town musicians and music lovers sharing in the ceremony. The new auditorium, capable of seating 629 persons, is one of the most beautiful in the west. The interior was recently completed at a cost of \$76,000, including a \$22,500 gift for the new Reuter pipe organ.

The official opening is set for Saturday at 8:30 p. m. An organ recital by John Stark Evans, professor of organ and piano and choruses of the university, will be the program feature. Following the recital, an informal reception will be held. Preference at this concert will be given to out-of-town musicians and friends of the university and seats will be reserved for them.

The new Reuter organ which Professor Evans will dedicate is one of the finest in the northwest, although it is not as large as some pipe organs in Portland and Seattle.

FLAX SEED FROM PEN GOES TO VANCOUVER

PATHOLOGISTS IN BLISTER RUST DRIVE ARE HERE

O. E. Mellis, a pathologist of Spokane, and L. M. Gooding, of the Oregon Agricultural college, assistant pathologist in charge of white pine blister rust campaign, were visitors at the state forestry department yesterday to get information relative to the location of the white pine stand in the state.

Gooding said that a number of men will be placed in the field in Polk county this summer to make a survey of the white pine stands and to determine the amount of black currant growing in that section. The currant is a host plant of the blister rust and its eradication is necessary in the control of the disease.

Mellis will be in charge of a crew of about 50 men who will undertake some experimental work this summer in the Woodruff Meadows vicinity in Jackson county west of Crater lake national forest park. There is a large stand of white pine in that section and the crew will be engaged in the work of eradicating the wild currant in order to determine the cost. Other work will be to secure an accurate topographic map of the territory to be treated. The men will be placed in the field about the middle of June.

Gooding says the blister rust has not appeared in Oregon as yet but has appeared in Washington. Oregon has about 30,000,000,000 feet of white and sugar pine of high commercial value and every effort will be made to keep the disease out of the state.

HEAD-ON SYSTEM DECLARED BEST

Mr. Borrevik saw the light of the fire in the windshield but at first thought that it was the headlights of a car coming from behind. When he glanced around he found the fire was in his own car. The chassis of the car was saved but the two barrels of gasoline and 15 gallons of oil were destroyed.

It is thought the fire was caused by the oil dripping on the manifold.

SEEK NATURALIZATION AFTER 38 YEARS HERE

Their petitions for naturalization will come before the court at the October term, as the law requires a lapse of 90 days from the date of filing, and no summer session is held in Polk county.

PORTLANDER IN RACE TO SUCCEED SEN. STANFIELD

Of the many talked of candidates for the republican nomination for United States senator against Robert N. Stanfield in the primaries next year, James J. Crossley of Portland is the first to get actively into the field, and already is circulating letters among republican leaders of the state, announcing his candidacy for the nomination. In a letter received in Salem, Crossley says: "I am a candidate for the republican nomination for United States senator to succeed Robert N. Stanfield, and I write you with the hope that you may come to a favorable consideration of my candidacy and give me your valuable support among the republican workers. As to my qualifications, I have had considerable legislative experience, having served five sessions as state senator and have practiced law since 1909, except about three years of the time, during which I served with the Oregon troops on the Mexican border in 1916 and in France, Belgium and Germany in the late war during the years of 1917, 1918 and 1919. I also served six and one-half years as United States attorney and I feel that I would be able to give the good people of the state of Oregon satisfactory service."

"I would very much appreciate any support and assistance you can give me, will do my utmost to prove worthy thereof and will not forget your kindness. If I am nominated and elected I will certainly do my utmost to co-operate with the republican leaders in building up and maintaining a good strong organization."

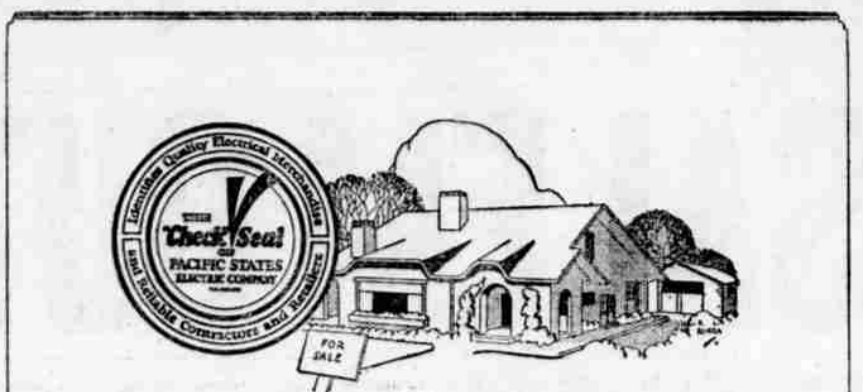
