

### FIRE FIGHTING AT NIGHT LOSS DECIDE RANGERS

Eugene, Mar. 31.—How to suppress forest fires is the subject of a conference in Eugene this afternoon in the postoffice building. Having considered the factors influencing the action of fires the visitors are taking up the details of actually fighting the flames after they are started, and will continue with discussing errors of judgment made in the past.

Night work was declared inefficient for the first 24 hours in coping with forest fires, in the opinion of most of those at today's meeting. W. B. Osborne, fire chief of the district who is presiding at the session, declared that only in unusual cases is night suppression profitable. Handicapped by poor light, heavy underbrush, and inability to see falling snags and rocks, the fire-fighters are usually in poor condition to continue the work at night.

It is estimated, according to reports of fires last year, that the night fireman is only about 25 per cent efficient as compared with day work.

Approximately sixty foresters and guests attended the banquet last night, at which Nelson F. MacDuff, supervisor of the Cascade national forest, presided as hostmaster.

Representatives of the three national forests—the Cascade, Stauw and Umpqua—were introduced, as well as officials from the district office at Portland. Copies of "The Cascadian," a new newspaper published by the Cascade forest were distributed to each guest at the banquet table.

Meetings will continue for another day.

### GASOLINE TAX FOR FEBRUARY TOTALS \$201,309

The state tax on gasoline and distillate for February amounted to \$201,309.25, according to a statement by Secretary of State Koser. Taxes were paid on 6,605,573 gallons of gasoline and 248,006 gallons of distillate. As compared with February last year gasoline sales increased about 15 per cent and distillate sales 79 per cent.

Up to the present time the motor vehicle fuel tax measures have brought into the state treasury a total of \$8,087,366.50. Of the amount collected under the act of 1921 there has been returned by March 30, this year, the sum of \$245,789.64 to operators of farm tractors, motor boats, commercial cleaning establishments, etc., pursuant to the provision authorizing refunds of taxes paid on gasoline used for purposes other than on the public highways.

"Two important amendments to the refund law were made by the recent legislature," said Secretary Koser. "The time for filing claims for refunds, at present 90 days, was extended to one year, and the rate of refund on distillate was changed to 2 1/2 cents a gallon, to include the tax paid under the law of 1919. These changes will be effective on and after May 23 next. The refund rate on gasoline will remain at 2 cents as at present, and the increased rate on distillate will apply only to purchases made after the new law becomes effective."

### NEW PASTOR FOR CHURCH HERE HAS BEST OF RECORDS

The following is taken from an Algona, Iowa, paper, published in a city where Rev. F. C. Taylor, new pastor of the First Methodist church of Salem, was a pastor. Rev. Mr. Taylor is expected to arrive in Salem, April 19:

"Rev. Fred C. Taylor, pastor of Grace Methodist Episcopal church, since 1920, has accepted a call to the pastorate of the First Methodist Episcopal church of Salem, Oregon.

"Announcement of the transfer, which was requested by Bishop W. G. Shepard of the Portland area, was read by Mr. Taylor to his congregation at Grace church Sunday morning. He will preach his farewell sermon on Easter Sunday, April 12.

Rev. Mr. Taylor united with the northwest Iowa conference in 1901, after graduating from Garrett biblical institute in 1900, and served the churches in Anthony, Ireton, Algona and Spencer. He was elected twice to represent the northwest Iowa conference at the meetings of the general conference.

"In addition to his church work the pastor was active in other lines. For ten years he was a trustee of Morningside college, and he has been a trustee of the Methodist hospital since its incorporation. Rev. Mr. Taylor is a thirty-second degree Mason, being a member of the Oscar Holmberg clan of the Slous City Consistory of Scottish Rite Masonry. He also is a member of Columbian commandery, Knights Templar, a Shriner and chaplain of Sunrise chapter, Royal Arch Masons.

"The church to which the Grace church pastor gives is the First church of Salem, the seat of Willamette university and Kimball school of theology.

"In commenting on the work of Rev. Mr. Taylor here and in other pastorates in Iowa, Dr. G. T. Nettson, superintendent of Methodist hospital, said: "His activities in all of his ministerial fields have been attended with successes. His pulpit ability is recognized as a high order. As a pastor he is much esteemed by his parishioners and as a leader in the community life his influence extends far beyond the bounds of his parish."

"Rev. Mr. Taylor and family plan to leave Slous City for Salem on the day following his farewell sermon."

### PARDON NEEDED TO GET DRIVER'S CARD RESTORED

Unless Governor Pierce is willing to grant a full pardon to motorists who are arrested for driving their automobiles while intoxicated there is no way for him to restore to their their drivers' licenses, according to an opinion of Attorney General Van Winkle in reply to an inquiry by the governor in the Paul Shallenberger case.

Shallenberger, a Portland manufacturer, pleaded guilty to the charge in a Hood River county justice court. The justice of the peace fined him the minimum of \$100 provided in an act of the recent legislature and revoked his license for a year, also required by the act, but did not send him to jail, although the law requires in addition to the other penalties a jail sentence of at least 60 days for the first offense.

Shallenberger's relatives appealed to the governor for leniency, his wife claiming she did not want to be inconvenienced by serving as her husband's chauffeur for a year pending restoration of his license. The governor put the question up to the attorney general.
