COMMISSIONERS SUED FOR RETURN OF PAY COLLECTED

Dallas, Or., April 2.—A suit to compel ex-County Commissioner Ezra Hart and County Commissioner William Riddell Jr. to return to the county \$2349.80 in per diem pay and mileage received during the period from January 1, 1923, to April 1, 1924, was filed in circuit court here Wednesday. The suit is brought by Ralph Saxey and Vera Gosso as taxpayers in behalf of the taxpayers of the county, and was filed by G. O. Holman, attorney.

The action is a follow up on a suit brought last May in which the April per diem and mileage of the two commissioners was attacked as unlawful, and the commissioners enjoined from collecting all but \$20 of their claim. This contention was upheld by Circuit Judge Phelps of Pendleton sitting in place of Judge H. H. Belt.

The contention at that time was that commissioners in Polk county were not entitled to any mileage allowance and that they were allowed pay only for the days when the court journal showed the court to be in actual session. Judge Phelps upheld this, stating in his opinion, that in order to oversee roadwork and collect per diem, commissioners must be specifically assigned to certain work at a session of the county court.

In filing the present complaint the court's journal has been used as the basis for computing the time the court was in session. This, according to the complaint, shows 87 days during the period covered and would allow each commissioner \$435 for his services.

During that period Commissioner Hart received \$1600 per diem and \$221.80 mileage, a total of \$1821.80. Under the suit he is asked to pay back \$1888.80 to the county. Commissioner Riddell received \$1110 per diem and \$786 mileage and this is claimed to be an excess of \$1461, which the suit would compel him to pay back to the county.

It is the intention to have the case come up at the April term of court, which convenes on April 13. In commenting on the 1924 suit, Judge Phelps stated that the law was unjust in failing to allow mileage or expense money to commissioners while transacting business.

Two new laws were introduced by Representative Fuller at the 1925 session of the legislature and passed. One of these requires commissioners in all counties to file an itemized claim schedule for per diem and expenses, the same as any other employe of the county, while the other allows Polk county commissioners to collect actual expenses incurred in transacting county business.

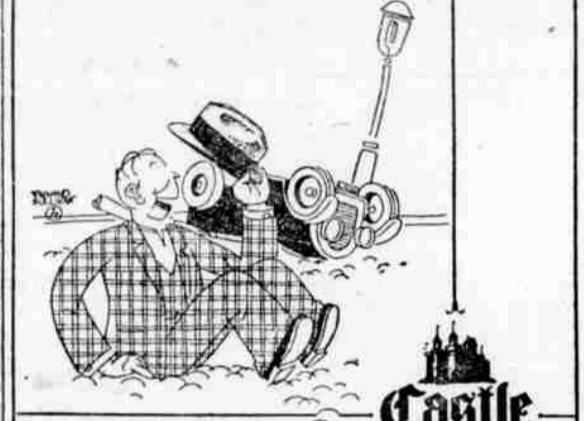
