London, Eng., April 2.—Vice Admiral Sir Michael Seymour, naval sea lord and chief of naval personnel, died today. He was born August 29, 1867, the son of the third baronet, Sir M. Calne Seymour. Sir Michael served as a rear admiral in the battle of Jutland, commanded the Black sea and Caspian squadrons in 1919 and was commander in chief of the North American and West Indies station from 1923 to 1924.

Earl Sande Back in Saddle; to Ride for Sinclair Once More

Earl Sande, considered America's foremost jockey, and a Salem boy, will be ready to ride again by May 1, after nearly a year out of the saddle, according to word received by air mail Wednesday by Mrs. Eva J. Sande, of 1865 Trade street, Salem. Mrs. Sande is the jockey's mother.

"I'm going back there in about 15 days myself," said Mrs. Sande yesterday. "I'm going to watch him in some of his races. I never have seen him ride a racehorse."

The accident occurred August 6 at Saratoga Springs. Sande had the inside, next the rail, and was riding a young horse. One of his opponents crowded him too closely and Sande in attempting to pull out, caused the horse to cross his legs and fall. His leg was broken in three places by the accident, his collar bone and one of his ribs were broken and it was commonly thought that Sande had ridden his last race.

He spent some three months in a hospital under expert medical care. He was no longer discharged from the hospital, than he became sick with gallstones and was forced to return. Discharged the second time late in November, he contracted the flu and returned again for two weeks. Since December he has been out, however. "He's been playing golf in order to get back his strength," says his mother. "I don't know whether he even jumped or not. He never would tell me."

STUDENTS SEEK SENTIMENT ON PARKING PLANS

The civics department of the J. L. Parrish junior high school, consisting of some 149 ninth grade students, will tackle the parking problems of the city of Salem today and tomorrow. A canvass will be taken of all parents and neighbors in the vicinity on the question of one and two-hour, and head-in and out, according to F. H. Lord, supervisor of the civics department at the school.

"We aim to make our civics a practical thing," said Mr. Lord yesterday. "Civics is the study of the government, and instead of studying it entirely in the abstract, we will take up this proposition as a concrete problem of local and city government."

The students will compile their statistics and make announcement of results Saturday. They will work under the supervision of Mr. Lord, Miss Signe Paulsen and Miss Lole Reed, all of whom are civics instructors at the school. A tabulation will also be compiled of the opinions held by the pupils themselves, following a general discussion in the class room.
