## BEARCAT DEBATE TEAM WINS FROM IDAHO COLLEGE

The Willamette university debating team defeated the College of Idaho at Caldwell, Idaho, last night, making the second victory for the Bearcat team on its tour. By winning the last contest of the trip, which is to be held against the College of Puget Sound Saturday, the locals can break even, three defeats being chalked up against them already.

The Willamette representatives have lost to the University of Southern California, to the University of Redlands, and the University of Wyoming. They have won over College of the Pacific at Stockton, Cal., as well as the Idaho team last night. The University of Denver was met in a no-decision debate.

The question used in all debates has been, "Resolved: that congress should be empowered to override by a two-thirds vote decisions of a supreme court declaring acts of congress unconstitutional." Willamette, represented by Redding and Berriman, had the negative throughout the trip except against U. S. C.

## DEFECTS OF RUM SMUGGLING LAW TOLD SENATORS

Washington, Apr. 3.—Virtually every angle of prohibition enforcement was delved into yesterday by the senate committee investigating the internal revenue bureau, getting the viewpoint of both the bureau and the department of justice on needed remedies before adjourning its sessions for a month.

The committee, in again hearing Mrs. Mabel Walker Willebrandt, assistant attorney general in charge of prohibition enforcement work, was carried into some of the technicalities of law that are making life hard for the new coast guard rum patrol and at the same time, she said, too easy for vessels that are seized for violations.

Because small craft under the stipulated five ton burden are exempt from the regulations applying to large vessels outside the three mile limit, Mrs. Willebrandt said, "practically nothing can be done to them when they are caught with a liquor cargo outside that limit. To remove present difficulties in taking action against American ships caught with liquor outside the three mile limit, in view of the supreme court decision that they do not constitute territory, she urged that congress make it a crime for American vessels to transport liquor under the American flag," outside that limit.

With rum row 15 or 20 miles off the coast, the witness said, the only course open to the coast guard is to watch the American boats that come on from the shore and get their cargoes from the parent ships of foreign registry. "If the coast guard waits until they get their cargoes, she added, "it cannot possibly pursue them into three mile limit, because their boats can't match the speed of the rum runners."

"Consequently," she continued, "the only thing they can do is to hope some other craft will pick them up when they get back to the three mile limit. That is like scattering shot; but if the coast guard could let off rum row and catch our own boats when they go out there, we would have an effective remedy."

## PHYSICAL TESTS FOR BOYS UNDER WAY THIS WEEK

The sixth of a series of ten physical efficiency tests, carried on at Salem high school under the direction of Leslie Sparks, head of the physical education department, was completed this week.

The 19 physical exercises which comprise the series are called the sit up, push up, pull up, rope climb, high jump, basket throw, football pass, 100 yard dash, shot put and running broad jump. The last four in the series still remain to be performed.

Grades are compiled on the basis of 100 points for each test given. Of the 500 high school boys who took the tests, only three passed the first six with perfect records. Lowest grades were made in the pull up, or chinning, and in the high jump. Highest grades were made in the sit up.

The sit up consists of lying flat on the back and sitting up 20 times someone holding the feet down. Practically all the boys passed successfully.

The push up is a common exercise, done in a position horizontal with the floor, the weight resting on the toes and the two hands. To receive a grade of 100 in the test a boy must touch his chin to the floor and push himself up until his arms are straight 20 times. The pull up is the well known "chinning" exercise. To get the full grade of 100 a boy must chin himself 10 times.

In the rope climb a perfect score requires the boy to climb a 16 foot rope in 6 seconds. In the basketball throw, tested for accuracy, the first shot at the basket is taken from a distance of 15 feet. All other shots are taken from wherever the ball happens to strike after the first attempt. To get 100 the contestant must successfully throw 3 out of 10 tries. In the football pass he must hit a mark 8 feet in diameter 60 feet away, 8 out of 10 tries.

Physical education classes are divided into squads, equals as well as men being matched against one another.

The purpose of the tests is to stimulate interest of the boys in their own physical conditioning and to furnish a basis for corrective exercises next year, according to Sparks.

## DAMAGES GIVEN MRS. DENNISTOUN DECLARED VOID

London, April 3.—(By Associated Press.)—Justice Sir Henry McCurdy delivered his reserved judgment in the Dennistoun case this morning. He held that the alleged agreement for Mrs. Dorothy Marcell Dennistoun's support by her former husband after their divorce was void and could not be enforced in law. Therefore he ruled that Mrs. Dennistoun's claim for damages for break of contract had failed.

The judgment sets aside the verdict of the jury last month awarding Mrs. Dennistoun 5000 pounds sterling or nearly \$25,000 for the alleged breach of contract. The plaintiff, however, recovers the total amount of 472 pounds, 18 shillings for sums loaned to Lieutenant Colonel Dennistoun and which he has not returned. She also is awarded the costs of the action with the exception of that part involving the allegation of breach of contract. This section of the costs, the court held, the defendant was entitled to recover. The judge ordered a general stay in execution. In delivering his judgment, Sir Henry deplored the fact that the disagreeable aspects of the case had to be made public, he added that the question of publicity was not one for the courts to decide. He quoted Lord Shaw in another famous case that "publicity is the soul of justice."

## RETALIATION UPON TRUCK MEN LOOMS

Insofar as county roads are concerned, lines operate on county roads between Salem and Silverton, Salem and Mill City and between Newberg and Silverton. The court has the power to put the minimum weight of load operating on county roads down so low that the truckmen would be forced out of business. At the present time the load allowed is 350 pounds to the inch, half of that allowed in the summer time. On paved roads the load may be heavier. But the court could enforce regulations that would cut the weight the trucks could carry down to the weight of the truck itself and put them out of commission.

"This move would not be effective unless the highway commission acted on state roads and other county courts took similar action on county roads. We will discuss this later."
