

TRAINING SCHOOL CONTRACT IS LET TO PORTLANDERS

The total cost of the new state training school for boys to be erected the coming summer near Woodburn will be \$216,839, according to bids opened by the state board of control yesterday and contracts to be awarded. For the general construction of the institution the low bidder out of nine competing was Setters Brothers of Portland. The bid of this firm was \$154,500, but with the decision of the board to erect a steel instead of a concrete smokestack and to eliminate five fireplaces the bids was reduced to \$149,670.

The plant will be comprised of an administration building, four cottages, boiler house, kitchen and commissary, water tank and tower.

The contract for electric wiring goes to the Morrison Electric company of Portland, bidding \$1049. There were eight bidders.

Plumbing and heating will go to Poy & company of Portland with bids of \$29,673 and \$21,665, respectively.

To the Pittsburg-Des Moines Steel company will go the contract for a steel water tank and tower at \$5882.

For the construction of a steel water tank and tower at the state hospital for the insane at Salem, the Chicago Bridge & Iron works was the low bidder at \$7820.

Relative to the last named bid the firm of Peole & Gonigal of Portland bidding \$7900, insisted that a differential of 5 per cent should be accorded him as against the Chicago firm, which would have made his bid the lowest. The board is permitted by law to make such a differential if most of the manufacturing work connected with the work is done in Oregon. Secretary of State Koser supported the Portland firm in its contention, but Governor Pierce and State Treasurer Kay opposed granting the differential. Kay pointing out that the precedent would be bad and would tend to block competition. In this case it was said that little of the work by the Chicago firm aside from the drilling of holes in the steel materials would be done outside of Oregon.

KEIZER SCHOOL VOTES TO RETAIN TEACHERS

The Keizer school board has voted to retain the services of Mrs. Mabel Martin as principal another year and Miss Georgia Albee and Miss Nellie Hilfiker, while Mrs. Hoyt Porter, now at Auburn, has been added to the teaching list, according to County Superintendent Fulkerson, who visited the school yesterday.

It states that the school also has added considerable playground apparatus and made improvements on the playgrounds, making that one of the best rural school playgrounds in the county.

At St. Louis she found the principal, Miss Genevieve Campan, absent because of illness. Miss Marie Mulford is teacher there in the upper grades and both have been retained for another year.

STOCK BAN NOT REMOVED

The movement of livestock from California will remain practically the same as at present, the state livestock sanitary board voting yesterday not to interfere with the present restriction on shipments that has existed since the foot and mouth epidemic until the last trace of the disease has disappeared from deer in the mountains.

Permits will be issued to Oregonians having herds in northern California if adequate government inspection is made, but no movements of fat stock into the Portland market will be permitted. To do so would not only create a danger of spreading the disease but would also have a tendency to depress the Portland market, in the opinion of Governor Pierce.

DISCOVER CAUSE OF DUTCH CANAL ODORS

Rotterdam, Holland. — An American once said that he could stand any death except by drowning in a Dutch canal, and indeed the offensive smells from many of these canals often make foreign visitors wonder how the natives can bear to live in such a perpetual stench.

These objectionable odors have now been traced to the presence in the water of a hitherto unknown micro-organism which the Dutch discoverer Dr. L. Elion, describes in the German Biological Journal. He has named the organism the vibrio thermodesulfuricans.

Invents New Echo Depth Sounder



Alexander Behm, noted scientist of Kiel, Germany, has invented a machine for utilizing acoustic properties for measuring depths. The sound waves from an exploded cartridge are recorded in fractional seconds, the apparatus automatically recording the depth of the sea over which a ship is traveling, or the height of an airship over the ground.

PATRIOTS' DAY PROGRAM BEING DISTRIBUTED

A suggested program for patriots' day, which is to be observed throughout Oregon on the 150th anniversary of the battle of Lexington and Concord, is being distributed to the schools of the state through the office of Superintendent of Public Instruction J. A. Churchill.

Since April 19 falls on Sunday, the day is to be observed through the schools on Monday, April 20. The program contains the governor's proclamation and patriotic poems, readings and songs. In urging the observance of the day to the teachers of the state, Superintendent Churchill says in the foreword of the pamphlet:

"April 19, 1925, will mark the one hundred fiftieth anniversary of the battle of Lexington and Concord, the initial contest of the struggle of the American colonies for independence. Because we feel that this day should not pass without fitting observance in the schools of Oregon, this pamphlet has been compiled with a view to assisting the teacher in organizing a suitable program."

"The teacher who has limited reference facilities at her disposal will be able to make a selection from the patriotic poems and addresses reprinted here. By the teacher who has access to an adequate library the program may be regarded as merely suggestive, since a more elaborate observance may be within the ability and

suited to the inclination of a particular group. The bibliography of sources appended to this pamphlet does not pretend to be all-inclusive, but will serve to launch the teacher on a search for material which need be limited only by the time and energy at her disposal."

Patriots' day should commemorate not only the anniversary of the battle of Lexington and Concord, but should afford an opportunity to rehearse the causes which led up to the American revolution, the economic and social principles which underlay the contest, and the consequences of the victory of the American colonies both in this country and abroad. Not only those who participated in the events of April 19, 1775, but patriot leaders throughout the colonies, whose dauntless devotion to the cause of liberty carried the revolution to a successful consummation, should be accorded the honor due them."

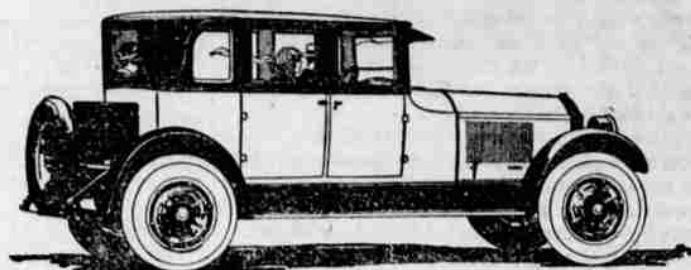
CHILD HEALTH WORK FUNCTIONS IN SCHOOLS
