Rev. George Henriksen preached the funeral services and Mrs. M. G. Gunderman sang, "God Be With You Until We Meet Again." Pall bearers were all Legionnaires, being Harry Carson, Otto Legard, Russell Scott, George Towne, Ernest Starr and Charles Reynolds.
