OFFICERS OF QUADRA ARE HELD GUILTY

Crew of Rum Runner Set Free; Case Pointed To As Setting Precedent of Liabilities.

San Francisco, Cal., April 4.—Conviction and immediate sentencing in federal court late last night of ten of 41 defendants in the Quadra rum running case was regarded by federal prohibition enforcement officials here today as establishing a precedent in fixing guilt on international offenders and exonerating crew members.

Officers of the Quadra, which was seized off the Golden Gate last October 12 with liquor from Vancouver, B. C., with an estimated value close to a quarter of a million dollars, were sentenced within ten minutes of the rendering of the verdict to payment of fines and imprisonment in the federal prison at Leavenworth.

Thirty-two members of the crew were found not guilty of the charge of conspiracy to violate the prohibition laws. Federal officers today called attention to the charge to the jury by Judge John S. Patridge, in which he said if you find that the crew of this vessel shipped aboard it without knowledge that it was carrying contraband cargo, they should be acquitted. If the captain is found to have knowledge that liquor was being unloaded from his vessel and delivered on the shores of the United States he should be convicted.

Vincent Quattrone, San Francisco agent, and Charles H. Belanger of San Francisco and Vancouver, B. C., director of Consolidated Exporters, the Canadian corporation which cleared the Quadra for Vancouver, for central American ports, were sentenced to two years each in Leavenworth prison and to payment of fines of \$10,000 each.

George Ford, captain of the ship, was sentenced to two years in Leavenworth and to payment of a fine of \$10,000. First Mate George Harris must serve 13 months at Leavenworth; Second Mate Jay Evelyn must serve 10 months in the San Francisco county jail.

advance during April of last year, when he was advanced \$300 on the 15th of the month. This was satisfied out of his pay warrant at the end of the month.

During May he drew \$525 and paid it out of his warrant at the close of the month. June was the first month that found him advancing exceeding his salary. In that month he was advanced \$635, or \$10 more than he had earned.

Totally found advances to Pierce totaling \$1160, or nearly twice the amount of his salary for that month, and August showed further advances of \$1025. In September he drew \$225. In October \$550, and in November \$140.

On December 1 the advances made to the governor since April exceeded his salary warrants for the same period by \$570.

The advances, according to employees of the treasury office, were made by the governor upon authorization by Mr. Myers and were entered only by assignments of salary given by the governor.

CAPTURE OF FUGITIVE INDIANS HELD NEAR

Klamath Falls, Or., Apr. 4.—Capture of Silas Barclay and Louis Knight, Klamath Indians who escaped from the county jail two weeks ago, is expected hourly. Word from Constable Shadley on the reservation this morning was to the effect that Barclay had been captured Thursday night by Indian Officer John Hall but had made his escape while being taken to jail. Knight was seen on a reservation ranch late yesterday by Constable Shadley.

The two Indians are being sought in connection with the death of Freddie Jackson, Indian cowboy, at Chiloquin last month.

Mack, two convicts at the state penitentiary, who claim to be the slayers of a man whose skeleton was found near Chehalis recently on Tilton river. SHIP SALE MAY RESULT IN LONG SUIT

Sale of Pacific Liners Likely To Precipitate Entire Shipping Board Policy Into Court.

Washington, April 4.—Prospect of a legal battle that may be carried to the supreme court of the United States and subject the entire government ship sales policy under the merchant marine act to court review and construction for the first time has been raised in the injunction proceedings brought by the Pacific Mail steamship company against a ship sales decision of the shipping board.

The heated controversy which has arisen over the board's decision to sell five ships in the California-Orient line now operated by the Pacific Mail to the Dollar interests, rested today in the hands of Justice C. Hitz of the District of Columbia supreme court who issued an injunction yesterday, temporarily blocking the sale. Hearings on making permanent the temporary injunction against the board have been set for April 13.

Whatever the outcome of that hearing, however, the case is expected eventually to bring before the United States supreme court the whole purpose involved in the ship sales clauses of the merchant marine act, designed to build up a stable American merchant marine under private operation by transfer of the government fleet. Bringing suit both as a party directly concerned and as a taxpayer, the Pacific Mail declared in its petition that the sale not only would violate the merchant marine act but that the board's action in regard to its bid for the five vessels had been an "arbitrary refusal to consider it after the company offered to modify the bid as to provisions held illegal by board counsel.

In the face of the company's representation that sales of the ships it now operates would result in "irreparable loss, injury and damage" to it, Chairman O'Connor of the board declared that if the injunction is made permanent he personally would favor cancelling the company's operating contract.

Two Hurt in Wreck.
Denver, Colo., April 4.—Two men, an engineer and fireman, were injured the former probably fatally, when the Denver & Rio Grande Western passenger train No. 16, from Grand Junction to Denver, was derailed at Cog creek, between Pueblo and Florence, Colo., early today. No passenger were injured, according to reports received by the dispatchers' office here.

CONTRACTS LET FOR HAULING OF COUNTY GRAVEL

Contracts were awarded this afternoon to L. R. Tweedle of Woodburn, J. H. Tweedle and L. M. Case and L. N. Howe of Salem for hauling gravel on roads in Marion county. Out of seven bidders on the Salem-Champagne road, L. R. Tweedle was lowest, his price ranging from \$1.19 to \$1.45 a yard. On the road near Stayton, Tweedle and Case put in a bid that ranged between 19 cents to \$1.31, depending on the length of haul. On the St. Paul job Howe bid successfully against seven others.

The contracts include gravel hauling for all of the work to be done out of the St. Paul, Stayton, Salem and Scollard plants. Bids for hauling from St. Paul covers 5000 yards or more, the same amount is covered in the Stayton bid, and the third bid is for 4000 yards or more, principally for work on the road from McNary corner from the river road south of Salem to the Waconda road, a distance of five miles. This is the road of the famous oak tree, the life of which has been preserved by the battle put up by Sila Finney.

The court contemplates graveling this section of the road this year with an idea in mind of paving it some day, it is understood, and eventually to have a paved road through to St. Paul.

No bids were received on hauling from the Salem plant as this work is done by local trucks when needed at a price so low that bidding is unnecessary. The court also contemplates installing a crusher at Hult for which material will be prepared for finishing the stretch between Silverton and Silver Creek falls.

Today Custer Ross of Silverton proposed a new market road to the county court "to think about." This is an eventual pavement from Silverton going out north of the Silver Falls lumber company, past the Allen ranch to the meridian line and thence on to Monitor on the Monitor road. This would give better access to the county seat for that heavily populated farming section, he pointed out.
