DEFENSE IN ELLINGSON CASE RESTS

Prosecution Opens Effort To Prove Mental Competence of Jazz Girl Who Killed Mother.

San Francisco, April 5.—Shortly before noon today the defense closed its case to prove Dorothy Ellingson insane, and the prosecution began its effort to establish mental competence in the 17 year old girl, who killed her mother last January 13 in a quarrel over the girl's devotion to the night life.

While Dr. Jau Don Ball, a defense alienist, was being cross-examined the better part of the morning, the girl, displaying perfect composure, smiled broadly at some of the psychiatrist's statements and sometimes shook her head emphatically.

Prosecution Opens
In a very brief opening statement for the prosecution, Assistant District Attorney Harmon D. Skidlin said he expected to establish that the girl was sane.

Murder Jury Excused
The jury in the murder case, which is interrupted by the sanity trial, was excused today for one week.

Questioned by Assistant District Attorney Harmon D. Skidlin, Dr. Ball said it was "impossible to define insanity." "Any deviation from the normal,"

Dr. Ball also conceded that the defendant seemed to be in good physical condition, but added that psychiatrists were more concerned with conduct, in the absence of any organic disturbance that might cause abnormality.
