REVEAL JAZZ GIRL IS SANE

Mrs. O'Shea, that the people who were trying to prove her insane were more insane than she was.

"I never meant to do it," the girl said of her deed in killing her mother, Mrs. O'Shea related.

The girl had complained that Dr. Ball (a defense alienist) was "sarcastic and surly" to her and she did not like him.

"She later asked him how to solve it, and he said he didn't know."

The witness added that a week after the murder trial had been in progress, the girl returned to prison saying:

"Have you heard the latest? They're going to spring insanity on me."

One day, said Mrs. O'Shea, the girl went over a newspaper story about her mother's death and insisted that it was not true she had fired two shots, she had "pulled the trigger but once."

The witness said she was seated by the girl last week when her father was on the stand. At certain statements the girl whispered:

"That's all lies; he doesn't understand the questions."

Dr. Lloyd Bryan, an X-ray expert, controverting testimony by the defense, said there was nothing abnormal shown in X-ray photographs of the defendant introduced in evidence. He testified that there was nothing indicating "over development" in the fact that the girl had an erupted wisdom tooth at the age of 16.

THOMPSON IS SENTENCED AND PAROLED

Introduced three witnesses, including the defendant, Thompson admitted that he had taken the approximately \$935 mentioned in the indictment against him, but intended to pay the money back and had done so. Most of it had been spent, he said, for the benefit of his wife's health. In addition to the \$935 Thompson said he had paid back \$100 to cover a shortage in the treasury that could not be traced. The loose practice of the treasury department in advancing salaries to officials and employees, Thompson claimed, resulted in his arrest and indictment.

Besides Thompson, Attorney McNary called as witnesses, Fred Lamport, vice-president of the United States National bank. Lamport said he had known Thompson for several years and had known him as a man of good reputation. A. T. Woolpert, local druggist, was also a character witness in Thompson's behalf. He said Thompson was a veteran of the Spanish war and prominent in military circles.

Thompson declared that Alexander Hamilton, another employee of the treasury had drawn at one time a full month's salary in advance and had given no assignment. Governor Pierce, he said, was at one time \$1100 in the state's debt, but that this was protected by assignment and was paid.

Operatives for surety companies who questioned Thompson prior to his arrest said he admitted to defaultations amounting to \$5000, but only the amount mentioned in the indictment was traceable to him.

In pronouncing sentence Judge Kelly said he wasn't impressed with Thompson's accusation that there were other transgressors in the office of the state treasurer. The judge informed Thompson that under his parole he would be expected to refrain from violating any law of the state.
