BROOKS TO ADD TO SCHOOL AND PUT ON TEACHER

Brooks, Or., April 8.—At a meeting of the Brooks school board it was definitely decided to add another room and teacher owing to the over-crowded and unsatisfactory condition, giving two grades to the primary teacher and three each to the other two. The two smallest grades will be placed in a room made by throwing the small library room and stage together and having movable seats so that the stage may still be used when wanted.

Mrs. Lester Robins will have this department. For principal, Mrs. Charles McCallister's application has been accepted and Mrs. Leta Nyhart will be in charge of the third, fourth and fifth grades. The changes made at the Evangelical conference affecting this locality were by separating the Brooks church from the original pastor, while Middle Grove and Clear Lake will be under Rev. Earn. Rev. W. E. Simpson, who formally held the three, will move to Airle and also have Lewisville. Rev. Simpson will have one more Sunday with the Brooks people but his family have not yet decided whether they will move at once or wait until after school is out for the summer.

Silverton, Or., April 8.—(Special.)—The second annual convention of the Lutheran Brotherhood of Oregon and southern Washington district will be held at Silverton on May 2, 3 and 4. 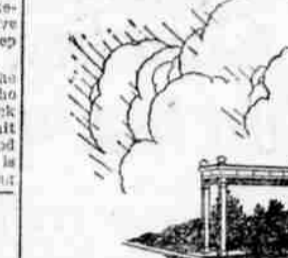
