

BEARCATS LOSE TO LAWRENCE ON RETURN DEBATE

History repeated itself last night for the second time a Willamette university debating team went down to defeat by a 2 to 1 decision before representatives of Lawrence college of Appleton, Wisconsin. One Lawrence speaker, Willard Henock, met the Willamette team on its eastern tour two years ago. The Lawrence coach, F. W. Orr, spent four years as debate coach of Pacific university, leaving there some 11 years ago, and having been at Lawrence college ever since.

The Willamette team, consisting of Charles Redding and Joel Berriman, upheld the affirmative side of the question, "Resolved, That congress by a two-thirds vote should be empowered to re-enact federal legislation declared unconstitutional by the supreme court." The two had had only three days in which to prepare on the affirmative since returning from their tour. Lawrence was represented by Henock and Bird. Seftenberg, a third Lawrence man, was with the squad, but did not speak last night.

Judges were Professor Rawson of the University of Oregon, Professor Macy of Pacific college and Professor Lemmon of the Oregon Agricultural college.

The Lawrence team has six debates scheduled on its present tour. They have met College of Puget Sound, Lafayette, Albany college and Willamette. The first two were defeated unanimously. The Albany college contest was on a no-decision basis. Washington State college and Cornell college still remain on their schedule. Washington State college will be met Saturday night.

Erbert Ray Nicols, coach of the Redlands university debating team and editor of a series of debate books, has requested Redding and Berriman to write their speeches and send them to him for publication. This will be the first time that Willamette speeches have appeared in the book.

VON HINDENBERG TO BE CANDIDATE OF BOURGEOISE

Berlin, April 8.—(By Associated Press).—Field Marshal Von Hindenberg was nominated today as a candidate for president of the German republic by the national-conservative bourgeoisie bloc.

It was announced that the field marshal had agreed to stand for the office.

Von Hindenberg's nomination

was forecast several hours before he accepted, as it was known he had agreed to run against former Chancellor Wilhelm Marx in the elections of April 26 if secured of the united support of all the parties comprising the national bourgeoisie bloc. Despite the opposition of Foreign Minister Stresemann, it was stated before hand that the German peoples party would not oppose the field marshal if he was nominated.

Von Hindenberg's protests against entering the gruelling race on account of his age were met by supporters who adducted to the aged war hero the examples of men on the verge of 80 who had made good as statesmen. They pointed out that Bismarck when he retired was considerably older than the field marshal. The cases of Clemenceau and Balfour also were cited.

There were plenty of objections to the field marshal's nomination voiced in the nationalistic ranks here, numerous members of the old regiment literally "standing aghast" at the suggestion that "the one remaining figure of the glorious past" be dragged into the quagmire of German party politics.

SENATORS OPEN SEASON SUNDAY AGAINST CAMAS

Everything is in readiness for the opening game Sunday afternoon when the Salem Senators open the interstate league season here with the Camas team. The required work on the ball grounds is nearly completed and the fans are promised one of the best teams in years. Work has been finished on the fence, where the wind blew it down during the winter. Work has also been done on the grandstand, bleachers and players stand has also been fixed. The grounds have been scraped and rolled and the field will be in the best of shape.

According to Snyder Van Patten, president of the board of directors, the club will be the best that Salem has ever had or at least in recent years. The joining of the interstate league has assured Salem of first class games and the fans will be sure of seeing fast ball. The funds of the ball club are to be handled by the board of directors who are setting for the 1925 season without remuneration. They have already spent considerable time in boosting the club as they are merely anxious to see a good ball club in Salem, according to Van Patten.

Campaign for the securing of funds has already been started and the men who are out report "air success." "We are in hopes that the business men will back the club this season as it will decide whether the fans want good baseball here," claims Van Patten. "The players are all on contract and will be guaranteed a certain salary and all of the rest will be entered in the club's funds. Last year the players received a cut on the receipts and all the money was spent. This year the Senators will have a surplus with which to start a team next year if the crowds support the team."
