**Part II—Crucifixion—**  
March to Calvary, instrumental. Then They Put On Him, chorus. O Sacred Head, chorus and solos. And Jesus When He Had Died, bass recitative. O Come and Moura, chorus and solos. And Behold the Veil was Rent, bass recitative. Truly This Was the Son of God, chorus. And the First Day of the Week, contralto recitative. Your Lord is Risen, soprano aria. He is Risen, chorus. The Head Once Crowned with Thorns, quartet and tenor solo. In the Cross of Christ I Glory, chorus. Benediction.

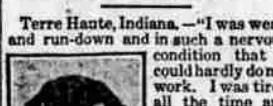
