

PAST PATRIARCH OF ALL RUSSIA DEAD IS REPORT

Moscow, Apr. 8.—(By Associated Press)—The most Rev. Dr. Tikhon, former patriarch of all Russia, died of aneurysm in a private hospital here early today after an illness of three days.

Archbishop Tikhon, who as archbishop of New York once was in effect the head of the Russian church in America where he spent nearly ten years, was chosen metropolitan of Moscow July, 1917, and became patriarch of all Russia and was formally enthroned in the Kremlin cathedral in November of that year. He was considered a progressive in the Russian church of that period, but shortly began a campaign of opposition to the bolsheviks because of their attitude toward the church and had the "anathema" pronounced upon them in the Russian churches.

This course resulted in the announcement in May, 1922, of his abdication as patriarch. His arrest was reported shortly afterward and it was several times announced that he would be placed on trial for his opposition to the soviet action in confiscating church treasures and other measures against the former rights of the church. The successive postponement of the trial were followed by an announcement late in 1923 that the patriarch had been released from prison and proceeding against him abandoned on his giving out a letter expressing regret for past hostility to the soviet government. Later he moved toward reconciliation of the faithful of the orthodox church with the new "living church" organized by the reformists.

Meanwhile the patriarch had been unfrocked by an orthodox church synod, but declined to recognize the unfrocking, declaring the assembly was an illegal one.

Parents are still begrudgingly allowed to produce children without other interference than a lot of frayed advice, but as soon as the child reaches a sanitary area it is decreed that the parents shall step back and allow a crowd of bad gamblers to take charge and try a lot of theories on them. (The theories must be all right, because they sound so reasonable in print, so numerous from the platform of the parent-teachers association, and have been evolved by people who are not foolishly prejudiced by having children of their own, and can therefore speak with assurance and certainty.)

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liked it, and moved immediately to perpetuate their jobs. Reorganizations were hastily effected; "drives" were instituted; war enthusiasm was still with us and we responded easily. I had become second-nature to us to yell "Hurrah!" every time anybody said "Hip, hip." The home and its intimate interests, schools, etc., became the prey of the inspired army which claimed to know so much? more and have so much more vision than the rest of us. When they talked about "broadening the curriculum" we fell for it. They broadened it, all right—broadened it until it reaches from 7 a. m. to 11 p. m., which don't leave much time for home training. The children have become school slaves, and the school rules reach not only the children but the homes from whence they come. Yes, home programs must be revised to meet the arbitrary notions of those who have relieved us of the job of training our children.

The main idea is that from September to June the children shall be so completely enmeshed in school affairs that parents shall have no chance to say more than "here they come—there they go." It has become almost a misdeed for parents to take an inquisitive interest in their children—so many other folks confess that they know so much more about it. And in all of the long hours devoted to this "education" thing, it is like hunting a needle in a haystack to attempt to find anything worth while. It is a little of this and a little of that, with a great paucity of anything really important. And, as you have frequently said, every thirty days some old maid's improvement society discovers a new paramount fad, immediately begins to cackle about it, and soon the curriculum is further "broadened" to accommodate it—at proportionate expense to the parents who are taxed to support the "free" school system.

And then during vacation attractive side issues are arranged to keep the youngsters from getting too well acquainted with their parents and possibly becoming subject to their baleful influence. Even the little ones must go to a public playground and be properly "supervised." There seems to be an impression that all of these ducklings have been hatched by a hen who is unable to teach them to swim. If any intrepid parent wants to know what will happen if he attempts to modify these conditions, let him try it. I did—and found out. And yet, when a case of juvenile delinquency appears, you editors fill your columns with denunciations of parents! It is too late to do anything

about it. The system is organized, capitalized (sub rosa) and supervised by experts; the Rockefeller foundation, the International Harvester Co. and kindred interests. All they wanted was a chance, just a little toe-hold; they got it and are now in complete control. They are too big and too clever for us to lick. We can't outbid them. They are not bawling the job disinterestedly. The most disheartening feature of the whole business is that our children are being taught the very things that we don't want them taught; contempt for things they should respect and respect for things they should hold in contempt.

The children like the new system, of course. That is part of the clever scheme. "Self government" with crap games and jazz parties on the side and "funding" officially recognized as a part of the course of study, is a lot more fun than the business-like schools their parents attended. So, in any attempt to change conditions we would have the active opposition of the children themselves. And one of the beautiful things they are being taught is that they have a right to oppose their parents. This is called "individuality"—something the every child should cultivate by all means.
