

BALLOT TITLES COMPLETED FOR REFERENDUMS

Ballot titles for 11 proposed constitutional amendments and measures that will go before the people at the general election in 1926 have been completed by Attorney General Van Winkle.

Included in the list is the famous Dennis resolution No. 5 providing for a constitutional amendment to prohibit income and inheritance taxes in Oregon until the year 1940. Senator Bruce Dennis of Union and Wallowa counties introduced the resolution, which was the subject of a warm controversy in the legislature, and which is now the basis of a recall movement against Dennis in his home county of Union.

The other measures for which ballot titles have been prepared are:

- Authorizing the Portland school district to levy tax in 1925 not to exceed \$900,000 in excess of the 6 per cent limit over 1924 and allow this base to be used for computing the tax in 1926.
- Authorizing Klamath county to issue bonds sufficient to meet outstanding warrants.
- Providing that in event of recall elections the persons to succeed the recalled official shall be appointed instead of elected in the recall election.
- Authorizing the governor to make appointments to fill vacancies in certain offices, the appointee to continue in office until his successor shall have been elected and qualified.
- Authorizing a state normal school at Seaside.
- Authorizing a state normal school in eastern Oregon.
- Authorizing a state tuberculosis hospital in eastern Oregon.
- Authorizing Curry county to issue bonds sufficient to take up outstanding warrants.
- Repeal of constitutional provision prohibiting negroes from having civil rights in Oregon.
- Authorizing Klamath and Clackamas counties to issue bonds to take up outstanding warrants.
- Efforts are being made to invoke the referendum on two measures passed by the legislature—the bus bill, which levies a heavy tax on motor vehicles used for common carrier purposes, and the revenue bill requiring self-sustaining state activities to divert 10 per cent of their proceeds to the general state fund.

SALEM BOY RETURNS TO CITY

Dr. Carl W. DeLee, the foremost authority on obstetrics in this country, where he was a member of the resident staff.

In connection with his work Dr. Emmons has made an intensive scientific study of the diet, general hygiene and prevention of complications in the prospective mother. While in the east he assisted in perfecting the most scientific method of parturition so far known to the medical world.

He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. W. W. Emmons, 828 North Commercial street, of this city, actively interested in civic movements and is a member of the Portland Lions club.

MONMOUTH TO BUILD NEW GYM

A new school gymnasium is to be built at Monmouth. Freeman & Struble, Salem architects, have been engaged to draw plans for the building to be built on property owned by the school district located toward the normal school campus, from the high school building. It will be built of hollow tile, with a stucco exterior and measure 62 by 90 feet. All public schools of the city will use the gymnasium. For basketball games the playing surface will measure 40 by 70 feet, with four rows of bleachers on each side. Seating capacity is estimated at over 500.

Bids on the work will be called for near May 1, the architects having stated that plans will be completed by that time.

The structure is expected to cost something over \$10,000.

DALLAS HAS NEW STREET LIGHTS

Dallas, Or., April 9.—The new decorative street lighting system for the Dallas business district was the occasion for a celebration Monday night when it was first turned on. The band gave a short concert, Mrs. Merle Ebbe sang and W. W. Harcombe, president of the chamber of commerce and Z. E. Merrill, assistant general manager of the Mountain States Power company, gave short speeches. A large crowd was on the streets to participate in the exercises.

The new lighting system is the first to be installed in the territory of the Mountain States Power

company and the officials of the concern are taking a great deal of interest in it. The system was established under a ten-year contract between the city and the company.
