

CAMP GROUND ON UPPER SANTIAM ROAD IS PLANNED

Mill City, Or., April 9.—Work has been started on the first auto camp ground which will be established on the new Mill City-Detroit highway at Berry, about three miles west of Detroit. This is an ideal site for a camp ground, there being a bountiful supply of spring water and wood, and in addition to this, the fishing is fine, both trout and salmon. The state salmon fish racks are located about a mile upstream from this camp, which keeps the salmon back in the vicinity of the new camp grounds. A commissary will be opened, carrying foodstuffs, gasoline and oil. The camp will be open for business when the highway is thrown open to the public, probably in June. This highway will be one of the finest scenic drives in the state and will open up a new territory to motorists.

SEEK CAUSE FOR GREATER USE OF DOLLAR BILLS

Washington, April 9.—The rapidly growing popularity of the dollar bill has become a problem to treasury officials. The government is faced with the necessity of either greatly expanding the capacity of its printing plant to meet the public demand for circulation of the unit of paper currency, or inducing the public to be more economical in its use.

Just why there is a demand for the dollar bill that its circulation has increased more than seven times since 1900 and exactly three times since 1919 is a puzzle which officials have started out to solve. He hopes by the study to find means of obtaining a more sparing use of it.

The big plant of the bureau of engraving and printing, built in 1914, with the expectation that it would meet the nation's paper money producing needs indefinitely was forced in March to deliver to the United States treasury \$7,824,000 one dollar bills to keep up with the public demand for them.

To visualize the bulk of this job, the bill weighed approximately 113,472 pounds.

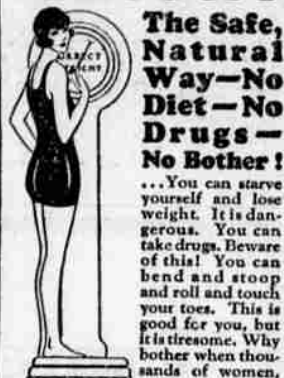

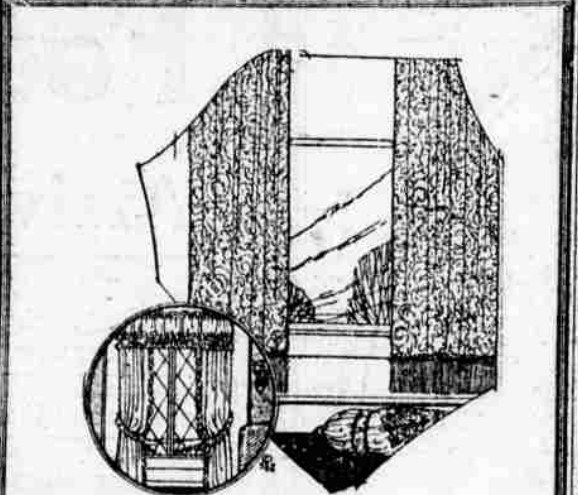
