Kansas City, Mo., April 9.—"Perfectly absurd," was the answer Mrs. Anne U. Stillman gave today to questions regarding a reported attempt of James A. Stillman, her husband, to bring about a reconciliation with his estranged wife.

She passed through Kansas City today on her way to Arizona for a vacation and was interviewed in the drawing room of a sleeping car, before she got up.

"I haven't heard of any such proposals from Mr. Stillman," she said when told that her husband's secretary was reported to have wired overtures to her. She ridiculed statements that her 14-year-old son also was seeking a reconciliation. The son, who occupied the upper berth of the drawing room, laughed out loud when the report was mentioned but made no comment.

Mrs. Stillman said that she had planned her vacation to rest from the strain of court proceedings and to get away from publicity.

Asked how she would accept offers of a reconciliation, she said: "I am not the type that can be hit over the head one minute and then give it when told to 'come kiss me honey'."

"You asked me if reports that I had spurned the advances were correct. I would not spurn them; I am not the kind of woman that would spurn anything. I have no hard feelings but sometimes there is such a difference in the nature of two persons that it is impossible for them to live together."

She laughed when informed of reports that she would start writing for a publication after her vacation.

"I have had some offers from some papers," she said.

## HOPE ABANDONED FOR KLAN DRAGON'S VICTIM

Indianapolis, Ind., April 9.—Miss Midge Oberholzer, Indianapolis, alleged to have been assaulted by Dr. C. Stephenson, former grand dragon of the Ku Klux Klan in Indiana, cannot recover from self-administered poison, according to her physician, Dr. John R. Kingsbury.

The young woman may live several days, the physician said. She has been unconscious a week. An infection caused a slight change for the worse last night. Some hope had been entertained for her recovery because of her vitality.

## POLITICAL DISORDERS FEARED IN PHILIPPINES

Manila—Instructions to municipal officials to pass ordinances and regulations calculated to forestall disorders likely to arise between rival political groups during the present campaign, have been sent to provincial governors by the executive bureau. At the national elections, which will be held June 9 next, there will be chosen a new house of representatives, consisting of 93 members, one-half of the senate, consisting of 24 members, provincial governors and other officials. The members of the house are chosen for three years, while the senators are elected for six years.

## JERUSALEM GETS NEW CIGARETTE FACTORY

Jerusalem—Much interest has been aroused in Palestine commercial circles by the recent announcement that Jerusalem's first cigarette factory had been completed and had begun manufacturing goods, not only for home consumption but for export as well. Samples of the first cigarettes were sent to British government officials in London through Sir Herbert L. Samuel, British high commissioner of Palestine, and to Nahum Sokolow, also of London, who has been one of the prime movers to create a natural home for Jews, securely half of the tobacco used in the Jerusalem made cigarettes is home grown, the remainder coming from Turkey.

Dayton, O., April 9.—Money to purchase a site for the proposed new union high school building was voted by taxpayers of district No. 23 at a special meeting held early this week. The amount set aside was \$2490. The site selected faces the highway on the western edge of town and it will be turned over to the new high school district as a donation as soon as organization of this district is completed. A vote on the question of transportation revealed the local district overwhelmingly in favor of it. There was but one dissenting ballot.

## 2000 DEGREES HOTTEST BUILDING CAN GET

Washington, April 9.—A temperature of 2000 degrees Fahrenheit is probably the maximum heat that can be generated in a fire district, bureau of standards scientists concluded as the result of recent experiments.

In order to test fire resistant building materials, the bureau conducted a series of imitation conflagrations. The highest temperature resulted from a hypothetical "library room" carrying 58 pounds of combustible material per square foot of floor by stacking up old records from the navy. The temperature around 2000 degrees warped walls and flooring and the structure did not cool for 24 hours.
