

BUTTER MARKET WEAK; PRICE OF EGGS HOLDS FIRM

Portland, April 10—The butter market is weak. Production is increasing and cube stocks are again accumulating in this market. Shipments to the north partly relieved the surplus here during the past twenty-four hours but extra and standard cubes ranged from a cent to 1 1/2 cents lower on the exchange being posted at 42 and 41 1/2 cents respectively. No decline in prints has been announced. Country dressed meats are fractionally lower with 1 1/2 cents the top on choice light hams and 15 cents on hogs. Supplies moderate but demand quiet and limited to strictly fancy animals.

Egg prices continued to hold steady on the exchange. Received are good but well taken and the feeling is increasing that this market has hit bottom for some time. Live poultry prices are steady and unchanged. Receipts and demand appear to be well balanced. Light hen 23 cents and heavy hens 25 cents.

PRICES ON WOOL ARE IRREGULAR

Boston, Mass., April 10—The Commercial Bulletin tomorrow will say: "The demand for wool has continued in a desultory fashion and it is possible that there has been slightly more business during the week, although prices are still irregular. From the seller's point of view the price is unsatisfactory. Small lots are reported sold at scattered points in the west at prices which the growers in many instances are disposed to resist."

The Commercial Bulletin will publish the following wool quotations: Scoured basis: Oregon Eastern No. 1, staple \$1.42; \$1.45; fine and fine medium combing \$1.30; \$1.35; 3-9 blood combing \$1.15; \$1.20 quarter blood combing \$1.05; \$1.10. Mohair—best combing 80@85c; best carding 70@75c.

OREGON WINTER WHEAT CROP REPORTED LIGHT

Portland, April 10—The Oregon winter wheat crop in 1925 will be the smallest in many years, owing to the heavy winter kill. While much of the area has been reseeded to spring wheat, the normally lighter yield of the spring crop will tend to make the total wheat production for the state even lower than the light crop of 1924, said P. L. Kent, statistician of the United States department of agriculture today in the April crop report.

While the whole effect of the winter killing of fall seeded wheat has not yet been determined it seems probable that more than one half of the Oregon acreage seeded last fall has been either reseeded to spring wheat or other spring sown crops, said Kent. The condition of the remaining acreage is probably the lowest in the history of large scale wheat growing in the state, the percentage figure being placed at 55.0 per cent of normal, he added.
