

POWDER FIRM TO BRANCH OUT AND ERECT BUILDING

Announcement has been made that the Gabriel Powder & Supply company will embark in an entirely new line of business, handling building materials, and has made arrangements for the beginning of early construction work on a new warehouse to be located near the junction of Capitol and Union streets at a point near where the Salem-Dallas-Fall City branch of the Southern Pacific switches off from the main line.

The new structure will be of wooden construction, to be 50x124 feet and will cost in the neighborhood of \$7000.

E. A. Gabriel, manager of the firm, also announces that his brother, Charles C. Gabriel of Spokane will enter the new industry with him.

The business will not interfere with their powder and explosive concern. The firm makes it plain that no powder or explosives will be used in the new warehouse, that to be devoted exclusively to building materials and supplies.

The company has special magazines for its explosives these being established at Salem, Woodburn, Albany, Corvallis, Aumsville and Tillamook.

SAN FRANCISCO HOST TO FLEET

San Francisco, April 11.—(By Associated Press.)—The program of entertainment for the personnel of the United States fleet which was interrupted yesterday by Good Friday observance, was continued today with renewed vigor. The sixteen admirals attached to the armada were guests of Dr. Ray Lyman Vulbur, president of Stanford university and Mrs. Vulbur, at luncheon at Palo Alto. Following the luncheon officers and men were guests of Stanford university at the Oregon-Stanford track and field meet.

Meanwhile in San Francisco the Japanese community tendered a reception and tea to officers and their wives at the Japanese tea garden in Golden Gate park.

J. A. M. Elder, Australian commissioner in the United States conferred with Admiral Robert E. Coontz, chief of the fleet yesterday and then wired to the Antipodes several changes in the plans to the visit of a portion of the fleet to the southern continent. He also urged the desirability of sending a detachment of the American vessels to Hobart, Australia in addition to the present plans for calls at Melbourne and Sydney. This request was forwarded to the navy department.

EARTHQUAKE IS REPORTED

Washington, April 11.—A very heavy earthquake, at least 6500 miles from Washington, was recorded early today on the seismograph at Georgetown university. The tremors began at 6:02 a. m. and continued until 8:35 a. m. with the maximum reached at between 7:03 a. m. and 7:05 a. m. The Rev. Francis Tondorf, director of the Georgetown university seismograph observatory, said he was unable to calculate the direction of the disturbance from Washington.
