ABBEY HOTEL AT NEWPORT IS SOLD

The Abbey hotel, Newport's pioneer hostelry, was sold April 1 to J. J. Tobin of Oregon City, says the Newport Journal.

The Abbey hotel was established in 1871 by Mr. and Mrs. P. M. Abbey who conducted it until 1911 when their sons, M. H. and E. J. Abbey took control of it under the firm name of P. M. Abbey & company, and have operated the hotel until the present sale was made.

Mr. Tobin has been in the hotel business for over 20 years, coming here from the Hotel Cornelius where he has been manager for the past two years. He has owned and operated the Electric hotel in Oregon City for 15 years, where he has been very popular with both the traveling public and the home people.

Mr. Tobin said: "I have great faith in the future of Newport and believe the city is on the right track by doing all of this improving and I am glad to see such harmony between the various districts of the city. There is still room for much street improvement and I believe all these things are going to be done as rapidly as possible; if so, Newport's future is assured."

Mr. Tobin is contemplating making some improvements about the hotel in the near future. The Abbeyes intend to remain in Newport and look after their various enterprises here. "We will build a home on our Otseville property and will start building at once and expect to move in by the first of July," Mrs. Abbey said.
